Merricks' delegates shape the future of cross-cultural ministry

BOUNDARIES were crossed and bridges were definitely built at the recent Cross-**Cultural Mission & Ministry Retreat at** Merricks Lodge - paving the way for crosscultural developments and discussions that will shape UCA in the future.

It was held on our turf - Merricks Lodge is the Uniting Church campsite on the Mornington Peninsula - and was well attended by many (play spot the PPEP minister in the picture.) This year the Cross Cultural Mission & Ministry retreat participants harked from throughout Victoria and Tasmania and the retreat was held over three days; with more than 50 participants from congregations in VicTas.

Activities included community building exercises, pastoral conversations and presentations within the theme: Many Cultures, One God, One World and One Body. Professor of Old Testament Studies at the Centre for Theology and Ministry, Dr Monica Melanchthon, presented on the theme by examining and discussing



cake. Addressing a packed worship centre, Moderator Isobel Thomas-Dobson proclaimed the Word, including a reflection on the congregation rather than the building, the memories of events, relationships, music, food, ministers, celebrations and struggles.

The Moderator drew parallels between the congregation's journey and that of the disciples' growth in seeing and thinking as God sees things. She extended the thought into wondering what justice and fairness might look like, especially when we need to do difficult and unwelcome things like closing a school, and how we can learn from other cultures about serving.

She concluded by asking what we should look forward to in the future. The answer is we don't know, but by prayer, Bible study, worship and talking we can learn to be the best disciples we can be, who see God at work in the world around us, and know how to be as adventurous as those who began the journey 100 years ago.

In the Hall (built over one of the church tennis courts) photos and research from the past, collated by Rev Norman Marshall and Dorothy Evans, were cause for much interest as more and more food was brought in for lunch. The name tags were a real help to check if you knew the face above, but some folk had not changed much over the years. It was really great to catch up with friends and our children's friends from long ago. Congratulations and well done Edithvale Uniting Church.

Emmaus Walks were developed by the Methodist Church in the United States. Emmaus now comes under the umbrella of the Upper Room. It was brought to Australia through the Uniting Church in NSW. The UCA Assembly has a Memorandum of Understanding with Emmaus nationally. Emmaus Communities try to hold at least one Emmaus Walk a year.

An Emmaus Walk is a 72 hour live in Spiritual Walk that teaches, celebrates and lives out God's love and grace. The Walks are a good way to nurture discipleship and to develop leaders. Emmaus seeks to encourage participants to use their skills and gifts in the ministry and mission of a local congregation. Emmaus is not a church and does not replace a local church involvement. It is an Ecumenical movement. It is not a secret society. Participants are sponsored to attend a Walk.




Soccer success

A giant toilet recently appeared in locations across the CBD, as part of the Melbourne Fringe Festival, to draw attention to the 2.4 billion people in the world who do not have access to a toilet.

Lack of access to a hygienic toilet is the leading cause of death for thousands of children around the world every day. "Talking about toilet habits is uncomfortable, but when not talking about toilets costs the lives of 2,000 children-under-five every day, we need to start talking crap," chief executive of WaterAid Australia Adam Laidlaw said.

Halt maternal deaths in South Sudan by creating midwives

The new nation of South Sudan was born in war. Two million people were killed and four million displaced in 25 years of vicious conflict. Inter-clan conflict is rife and illiteracy as high as 90 per cent. Not only that, South Sudan's maternal and infant health figures are the worst in the world. It's estimated that 10,000 mothers die during pregnancy or childbirth every year.

UnitingWorld is working with the Presbyterian Relief and Development Agency (PRDA) to train young women in South Sudan in basic maternal health care. Each woman at PRDA's Midwifery School is being trained for 18 months before returning to home communities. Every one will

become a life-saving presence for mothers and babies.
