Leighmoor opts for green future

'SHOWING care for God's creation' - and saving costs - were the driving forces for Leighmoor UC to embark on a fundraising mission for solar panels in 2012... and they achieved their goal recently.

Thanks to The Highett Community Bendigo Bank the Wickham Rd, Moorabbin church has been able to install 20 x 5Kw solar panels on its roof space.

The church council and congregation were delighted to receive \$2,200 toward the total cost of the panels, which came to \$10.454.

The Highett Community Bank has paid to organizations around Highett \$1,560,000 in support of appeals for financial assistance to various projects.

Geoff Serpell, Council Chair at Leighmoor UC, says: "The Kingston Community grant of \$5,000 was also gratefully received and other donations to bridge the gap, as well as the running of a concert to fully cover the cost of the panels. It is the church's desire to set an example for the community; showing care for God's creation by reducing the carbon footprint and lessen the need to generate more electricity by burning coal. The other benefit will be to reduce future power costs for the church and its many tenants."

Stamp of approval

Whilst we are led to believe that postal mail has been replaced by email, the involvement of people across the synod who collect, trim and forward used stamps, along with phone and post cards, to be sold has resulted in \$39,975 being available in 2012 for distribution to 20 projects.

The Uniting Church Synod of Victoria and Tasmania Stamp Committee receives requests to allocate funds that have been raised in sales to dealers and collectors of used stamps. Recipients this year include projects in Frontier Services, Mission Liaison Group, UnitingWorld, congregations and SHARE.

This brings the total of grants distributed by Sammy Stamp since 1977 to \$648,975.

Please save stamps from envelopes remembering to leave at least 3mm around the perforations.

Christmas stamps need to be sorted and forwarded early in January as dealers are keen to buy up all Christmas stamps early in the year.

Could you be a crisis counsellor?

HELPING those affected by disasters is a great skill - but it is a skill for which people can train. The VCC is identified in the Emergency Management Manual of Victoria (EMMV) to:

- Provide personal support, psychological first aid and emotional spiritual care to individuals and communities
- Provide Community Chaplains for early psychological first aid interventions.
- Coordinate a multi faith response to emergencies
- Coordinate the emergency chaplaincy network for Victoria.
- Provide outreach activities with trained outreach and visitation workers.
- Coordinate State services of worship and assist in the organisation of public memorials and gatherings for the recovery of affected communities.
- Provide advisory and training resources for recovery and development for faith based organisations.

VCCEM has been involved in large scale events such as fires and floods, support workers for a community vigil for the life of Sarah Cafferkey and outreach support on finding Jill Meaghers body in the Macedon Ranges.

Co-ordinator, Michael Downing, says: "This role suits individuals with flexibility to attend incidents as they arise. We understand the need to juggle other commitments and there will be times when you may be asked to attend and will not be able to appear."

This training is essential for all in the faith community intending to respond to emergencies and disasters in Victoria. The Victorian State and Local Governments are continually increasing the requirements for people to enter disaster areas. The VCC is authorized by Government to coordinate and integrate faith communities' response when disaster occur.

Forging a real connection

IT must have been about two years ago that the young adult members of our church started talking about beginning a

partnership with some Indian church partners.

Shortly after a fundraising dinner was planned that resulted in thousands of dollars being raised for an 'exposure trip' to India in July 2011.

It was the start of something that has now become a project very dear to our congregation's heart. At church council recently we have discussed the idea of growing the partnership with one of the projects witnessed by the young people in India - schools for children of sex workers - a project run by UnitingWorld partner, Churches of North India. We visited a school in Delhi, called Nav Nirman, and learnt lots about the issues the students and their mothers face.

Most of the children at the school are victims of 'people trafficking.' Where girls and women are taken from their families in rural areas under false pretences and put to work in brothels. Their subsequent children have little hope for the future, unless they are given an education.

Churches of North India is committed to helping this become a reality and, since our visit to Nav Nirman, schools for children of sex workers have opened in Calcutta and something similar has started in Assam. Most importantly, they continue to educate rural communities in the north about the perils of trafficking. Back here in Brighton, we are hoping to continue our connection with this vital work in several ways. Firstly, our Christmas Day collection went towards this project and we hope that the money raised will hope to keep these incredible schools open and potentially help to fund new ones.

Our young adults have hosted a fundraising lunch, with music by one of their bands, which was an excellent opportunity to celebrate the great work in the 'children of sex workers programme' while informing their friends of all they have seen in India. All money raised will go towards our St. Leonard's Christmas Appeal total.

Also, we are hoping to take a group of adults on an exposure tour next May/June to witness this incredible

work in action, amongst other life-giving work done through international partnership. This sort of trip is an incredible privilege for anyone who comes along, as we get to move off the tourist path and into the lives of real people in their local communities.

Children and staff in these places open their doors and their hearts to us in extraordinary circumstances and we have the chance to form lifelong bonds that could change both of our lives forever. I can honestly say that my first trip to India in 2004 changed my world forever, and there is no place quite like it. We would like to extend the invitation of the study tour to all congregations in the Presbytery. Our Uniting Church tradition has always been to look outwards at Christmas and this year I'm excited that we are doing this in new and old ways. Our prayer is for peace, justice and relationship this year, as we look towards the reality that began with the birth of Jesus.

Community spirit scoops Ecumenical Award

IT was hot and windy but the interactive tableau of the story of Christ's birth went down a treat for families in Brighton recently.



The story was told by all the Christian churches in the community, with the tableaus set up in the grounds of St Andrew's Anglican Church.

Bethlehem in Brighton is an ecumenical initiative involving the Christian Churches in Brighton who have formed the Brighton Covenant of Churches. Children were guided around the stations by angels from the Baptists, while Mary, Joseph and the Innkeeper were from St Leonard's UC and the Church of Christ. There was a Baptist

and the Church of Christ. There was a Baptist and Anglican shepherd, three Wisemen from St Leonard's, Herod from Trinity UC and his

assistant from St Joan of Arc Catholic Church. At the entrance assistants



from St Joan of Arc gave children a show bag which included activities and a list of the times for the Christmas services in all of the participating churches. The drama tableau concluded

with an opportunity for children to have their photo taken in the manger scene, place a prayer on the prayer tree, and make some craft items to take home to remind them of the birth of Jesus. Live

music was presented by the St Leonard's youth band; there were baby animals to cuddle; a sausage sizzle and the important cake stall. The event was advertised through kindergartens and schools and more than 150 children participated. Wendy Adams, Chair of the Church Council at St. Leonards says: "Bethlehem in Brighton won the 2012 Ecumenical Award so this might encourage others to apply for the Award. There are some great things happening in our Presbytery and we need to make them known."



Record takings for this year's Christmas Bowl

Brighton Covenant Churches have sat outside the Safeway Supermarket in Brighton for the 'Christmas Bowl' collection. Individual churches - Catholic, Anglican, Uniting, Churches of Christ and Baptist - organise a roster for each day with volunteers from 9am through to 5 or even 7pm.

This effort lasts for one week in mid December and in recent years has consistently raised well over \$4,000. This year was an exceptionally good one, as the final figure for the week was \$5,258.

Together, churches across Australia raise almost \$2.5 million annually through the Christmas Bowl, which provides much needed assistance to people affected by conflict and poverty around the world. The Christmas Bowl began in 1949, when the Rev. Frank Byatt placed an empty bowl on the table during

Christmas dinner and asked guests to contribute the cost of their meal to support refugees escaping the devastation of World War II.

Many PPEP churches run their own Christmas Bowl collections but Rev Ian Cayzer, 0409 860 427, can advise on this simple way of raising money.


