Pulling together packs a punch



MANY across the Presbytery of Port Phillip East may know of the call that went out days before Christmas for clothing and household goods to be shipped urgently to cyclone-devastated Samoa.

Few know the end of the story, write John and Ann

Promises of goods came in to the leaders of the Mission Liaison Group. Promises to come along to help also came in. The congregations at Brighton, Frankston and Mount Eliza gave a total of \$1,230 with which rice, flour, sugar and noodles were bought – at discounted prices. By Saturday morning 28th December it looked as though thirty to forty people might turn up. And it seemed that with goods coming in slowly while that morning's work might be a good start, the regular volunteers would be left to finish the packing some time in the second week of January.

That wasn't how things worked out.

Car after car arrived at The Shed, 176 Chapel Road, Keysborough, from as early as 7.30am. Some came with clothing and household effects. Some came with food for morning tea or lunch. All came with a willingness to work. And work they did.

The priority was for light-weight clothing and household goods. The crockery needed to be overwrapped – in clothing. Empty Pots and pans needed to be filled – with clothing. All went into cardboard cartons. That activity went on for over four hours.

Meanwhile a smaller team carried the cartons to the container where the regular MLG workers did the packing. After four hours solid work they needed a break. Some responding to the call for help arrived late – just in time to take over from the exhausted packers. *Cont. on page 3*

Dr Zhang brings to UnitingWorld a strong capacity to reflect theologically, to manage programs and to help the whole Church understand more about emerging trends in what is popularly referred to as "the Asian Century".


Wesley's plan has the X Factor

College gets off to a flyer

THE year 2012 proved to be a fantastic start for the Uniting Church's newest coeducational college.

Cornish College started with 219 students - from the Early Learning Centre to Year 9 - and grew by 10% over the year. Located on the old St Leonards College site at Bangholme the new medium-fee college has attracted considerable interest and will start 2013 with a 50% increase in student numbers; plus it's first Year 10 group.

With fees considerably lower than the Category 1 independent schools, Cornish College is appealing to a much broader demographic. Demand for places is such that the College has had to double the number of classes at certain levels and commences three streams in Year 7.

Waiting lists already exist at a number of levels with major interest at the regular school tours, held one Saturday and one weekday per month. There has been great interest and support from the UCA and the College continues to work with a Presbytery subcommittee, which is exploring ways in which Cornish College and the UCA can work together to meet the needs of the broader community.

Principal Kerry Bolger says: "The work of the UCA in helping save this unique school, which focuses on 'Educating young people for a sustainable future,' has been a great witness to the wider community about the church's work."

The first joint venture was a Christmas Carols on the Green Concert which was a great success and families within the Presbytery are invited to an inaugural country-styled Carnival which is to be held on Saturday, March 2. Microloans develop nations

Last month Bentleigh UC made its 53rd loan to help people from disadvantaged nations help themselves. From a 'pool' of \$575 the church's M&O group has lent \$1,325. The loans are gradually being repaid and we are receiving that money back into our account. Whenever it builds up past \$25, we re-lend it. Some of our money has been 'recycled' three times.

Eighteen of the 53 loans have already been fully repaid. All loans are being repaid on schedule, except one - which ended in a loss of \$2.87!

Who do we loan to, and why? Here is one example: Chanthorn lives in Takeo province in Cambodia with her husband and six children. She sells noodles and earns \$3 per day; her husband drives a taxi and earns \$5 per day, three of their children work and each earns about \$3 per day. Bentleigh UCA, and thirty others, lent her \$1,000 to purchase a motorbike for her husband's taxi service to allow him to earn more income. We grumble about our ability to live on the Australian pension; try providing for a family of eight on \$17 per day.

Synod shows its stance

THE Synod recently pledged to continue a close and respectful dialogue with those of the Islamic faith in the wake of a planning application faux pas.

General Secretary, Reverend Dr Mark Lawrence, said the Synod did not endorse the grounds for an objection to the construction of a Mosque in suburban Melbourne made under the name of the chairperson of the Monash Uniting Church Congregation.

Dr Lawrence said he was disappointed with the wording of the objection and stressed that it was not a position supported by the Synod.

He said that while any member of the community may have valid grounds to object to a Mosque on parking and noise concerns but the suggestion that it could be a "a training ground for religious fanatics" was an outrageous and unacceptable statement.

"It goes against the Uniting Church's strong desire to interact with all faiths in a respectful manner. The statement inadvertently has wider ramifications that should not be interpreted as the position of the Church," Dr Lawrence said.

Bentleigh generates solar savings all round

Early in the year, Bentleigh UC gave the Robinvale congregation \$12,000 to put toward the installation of solar power at their church. The system became operational toward the end of 2012. This will result in a saving for their parishioners of at least \$2,500 per year (increasing at 10% p.a.) for the next twenty-five years. That's a gift that keeps on giving.

A prayer from Uniting Justice Australia

On Boxing Day, the solar panels on the roof of the Activities Room had generated a total of 26,659kWh of electricity, writes David Evans. Is that a big deal? Yes, it is - it means the machine has saved Bentleigh UC \$6,000 (and 14 cents!) in electricity costs.

By the end of January, the machine is expected to have ticked over 30,000kWh, a cumulative saving of \$6,400, the equivalent of almost 37t of carbon dioxide emissions. That, in turn, is the equivalent of reducing car travel by a whopping 181,000km ... half way to the Moon!

The installation of the solar machine, plus a number of behind-thescenes energy efficiency measures, means a reduction in annual energy requirements by 62% as the diagram below depicts.
