
this might cause across the Synod, however the Synod Standing Committee made the decision last night to delay any announcement relating to property divestment. Following an approach from some members of the

Uniting Church I requested the President, as outlined in the Regulations, to give a Ruling. The Presidential Ruling was not received until well after the Standing Committee had begun meeting last night. As a result the Synod Standing Committee determined that the best course of action was to postpone any decision making by a week, whilst the implications of the Ruling are clarified. The Synod Standing Committee will meet again on Monday 7 October.

If your Church Council had scheduled a special meeting this week as requested, feel free to continue with that meeting, to pray for the Synod Standing Committee in its discernment. Also please arrange to reconvene the Church Council at the same time next week to work on divestment decisions and/or pray for the congregations/agencies affected.

In the interim, please understand that the work of the Uniting our future Project Control Group and the Property Board will continue. Additional meetings will be held this week and updated proposals will be presented to the Synod Standing Committee on Monday, October 7. The communications process will then be resumed from Tuesday, October 8.

THE Asylum Seeker issue is very much in the news in Australia, both pre and post election, and the exploration of this age-old phonomenon has stimulated creativity in the arts as well.



The documentary feature film *Mary Meets Mohammad,* by Hobart filmmaker Heather Kirkpatrick, on this very issue is to be screened at the Kino Cinemas, 45 Collins Street, Melbourne on Sunday, November 3 at 6.30pm (including a question and answer session with Heather) and then from Saturday, November 9 until Wednesday, November 13 at 7.30pm. Matinee sessions are also planned. Tasmania's first detention centre opens and local knitting club member Mary, a

> staunchly Christian pensioner, is not welcoming of the 400 male asylum seekers mostly from Afghanistan. Mohammad is a 26 year old Muslim asylum seeker detained inside the centre and an unlikely friendship develops between Mary and Mohammad after her knitting club donates woollen beanies to the asylum seekers. Mary finds many of her prior beliefs are challenged as her relationship with Mohammad deepens.

History continues to be made at Mentone

THE tale of Mentone's origin as a seaside resort and the birth of its early churches in a temperance coffee palace held the congregation in rapt attention at the recent 130th anniversary of Mentone UC. Lay leader David Johnson, pictured right, commenced proceedings to celebrate 130 years of worship at the Davies Memorial Uniting Church in Mentone.

The congregation of about 70 people received greetings from the wider church, brought by Presbytery Minister – Mission & Education, Rev Steve Terrell, who also commended them as "good and faithful servants" with encouragement to continue living the vision of 'lives changed by the power of Christ's message.' The Call to Worship by Margaret Shilton who herself has been a member of the congregation for 50 years, Mentone Uniting Church triggered an excellent service and time

Mentone Uniting Church celebrates 130 years of worship and mission of remembering what is certainly one of the great stories of old Melbourne. The historical narrative of the building, tracing its Presbyterian roots to its namesake Mary Davies, wife of land developer n opening up the area

Joseph, a significant player in opening up the area in the mid-1800s provided the backdrop for a rich tapestry of innovation, enterprise, vision and adventurous generosity. Doug Eales shared more of the mission across the years including the pre-Union merge with Mentone Methodist. Missional pursuits included property purchases for migrants, halls built for youth, fruit and veg harvested for the community, and a number of social enterprises such as op shops and catering clubs.

David Johnson, also an excellent organist, was back for a Children's Address with a difference. The "Parable of the organ pipe" held the whole congregation enthralled as they heard about the history of the Mentone organ, how its pipes are only painted gold on the front, and in fact the side pipes, whilst functional, are purely decorative! The important thing is that the pipes all play their part - and it helps that they are also connected.

Rev Siotame Paletu'a, current minister in a string of more than 10 over the years, preached about being rich toward God, in the context of the pending impact of property sales against the backdrop of 130 years of faithful witness and service. The service referred to the opening lines of a hymn used to be painted on the front wall, 'Worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness,' but in a sign of the times, the wall is now painted white and hymn words come via a data projector.

Jemmy Bartholomeusz led prayers for the world before a rousing rendition of 'My eyes have seen the glory' with some moved to tears by the stirring organ accompaniment. Outside a Billy Tea feast awaited, with funds raised for Frontier Services.

Enhancing humanity through the presence of God

MY background is in nursing and I have a Graduate Diploma in Theology, writes Tricia Graham.

I did my first CPE unit in 2004 after retiring from palliative care nursing and I have to say, I was a reluctant starter! I thought I knew how to be with people in crisis, people facing challenge, deterioration and death. I couldn't have been more wrong.

Sure, I was an empathetic nurse, sure I had practical help-aids up my 'nursing sleeve', sure I could fix things as nurses do.

What I have learned through CPE is how to 'be with' someone in crisis and know that the 'fixing' is not in my hands. Someone said to me once not so long ago: 'Trish, there's only one saviour and it's not you.' Valuable words and I keep them firmly in front of me. CPE has taught me how to be with someone in need as they slowly speak their own wisdom in their own voice and hear their wisdom with their own ears. I just need to be there with my deep listening presence creating the fertile God space between us. It is from that space, that space of love and compassion that the help arises.

This has been a tough learning. I have done 3 CPE units culminating in an Advanced Level. I am now engaged in the pilot program of EcoMinistry CPE at the John Paver Centre for Clinical Pastoral Education at the CTM. The action/reflection model calls on participants to reflect deeply on pastoral encounters and then to share their reflections (personal and



theological) with peers and with supervisors. It invites participants to focus on the heart as well as using the head. It teaches participants about hearing their own story within an encounter but how to put that aside and so be fully present to the other and their story. For me it is an essential learning for ministry.

My favourite definition of pastoral care came from the late Graeme Griffin. He said: "Pastoral Care is when two people come together in the presence of God and the humanity of both is enhanced." In believe that in my own training and practice of pastoral care, I have learned much about what it is to be human. I continue my learning through the Grace of God.

Are you ready for the next level of pastoral education?

The St John of God Healthcare Victorian Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) Centre is seeking new participants in their CPE programmes for level 1, Advanced and Supervisory Training Levels.

Participation in the CPE programme will provide opportunities to:

- Grow in knowledge and under-standing of your pastoral role.
- Develop skills that will enable you to become a more effective Pastoral Practitioner.
- Deepen your awareness of each person's spiritual needs, hopes and resources.
- Become more aware of your values, attitudes and assumptions.

A unit of CPE will be undertaken part time (22 weeks) and the next Part-time Unit is from **October 15**, **2013 to March19**, **2014**.

CPE interns will participate in group work, two days a fortnight, on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, and undertake one day of clinical based placement at a St. John of God Hospitals or within a placement that is mutually agreed upon. CPE is worth 30 credit points towards a Bachelor of Theology Degree through the Melbourne College of Divinity.

Who may apply? Pastoral Practitioners, Chaplains, Parish Workers, Health professional, others from a diverse context who are interested in providing spiritual care.

How much will it cost? A fee of \$1200 per unit is payable on commencement of the programme. The fee does not cover parking or meals at St John of God Hospitals.

Glen Waverley Uniting Church celebrated the 100th birthday of Irene Marriott on September 3, 2013 although Irene's actual birthday was on September, 13. Irene and her husband Fred were well-known market gardeners in the Glen Waverley area and there is even a street in the area named after the family. "Irene is a very devoted and loyal supporter of our church," says Diana Coles "firstly the Methodist Church and now the Uniting Church." Irene used to teach Sunday school, was a very accomplished pianist, sang in the choir and was President of the Ladies Guild (now UCAF.) Irene was also a very community-minded woman, a Councillor of the Shire of Mulgrave for two terms, and only the second women to be elected to the Shire. Irene was also a Justice of the Peace for 30 years and a Probation Officer of the Children's Court, President of the Waverley Historical Society and a member of the CWA.

Irene is still an extremely active woman who hasn't lost her interest in people or the community. Well done Irene, and congratulations on your wonderful achievements and all that you have done to help improve the community in which you have lived for many years.
