Generations mark celebrations at Trinity

GUESTS, young and old, enjoyed a fantastic 160th Anniversary celebration at Trinity UCA recently.

Harry Morgan and Robert Swift, pictured, cut the cake at the celebrations for the 160th Anniversary of the Brighton Congregational Church.

Harry at age 3 was the youngest member and Robert over 90 nearly the oldest member present.

The cake was shared with the more than 90 members and guests who had sat down for lunch after the morning worship in what is now called Trinity UCA.

The first public worship of a group of Independent Church folk (now better known as Congregationalists) was held in a 10'x12' tent in early 1853. A temporary wooden structure was opened in November of that year and ultimately the substantial brick church which is still in use now was first used on 2 December 1875. In 1884 a Fincham organ was added and after major refurbishment in 1995-6 it remains an excellent instrument to this day. Extensive examination of the records in the UCA Archives

has been undertaken and from this a 40 page booklet was produced and copies given to all families present.

The celebrations began on Thursday 7th

November when a display of historical women's garments prepared by the Brighton Historical

Society was opened in Trinity House. On the Saturday two concerts were held. In the afternoon the Melbourne Composer's League held their yearly concert called Four Colours:Gold which featured numerous pieces by modern day composers using flute and a wide variety of percussion

instruments. In the evening students and staff (and some parents) from the St.

Leonard's College presented an eclectic program of music across many genres. More by Rev Ian Cayzer



Afterwards we sat down to a delicious lunch in Trinity House during which Rev Dr Ian Breward, a now retired Church History professor, spoke on the values that the Congregational Church has brought into the Uniting Church. Incidentally, the Trinity church building

in Black Street was the place where the Congregational Church in the mid 1970s decided to actually become part of the Uniting Church in Australia.

The weekend finished with an Organ Recital where our own organist and three others, including Chris Lancaster from St. Andrew's, entertained a crowd of 50-60 with a great variety of pieces.

It was a fabulous celebration which many members worked hard to achieve and which the whole of the Trinity community enjoyed.

Recreations is part of the church and hall complex – a light and airy space, and not having to pay rent has meant being able to keep the prices very low indeed.

Recreations has had more than 90 volunteers in its 20 years. Some have moved into care or passed away but are remembered with affection and stories of their own special ways.

In the early days, patience was a great virtue – after a day's trading to count the cash, balance the books, and realise that the \$2.50 taken had come from the volunteers' own purchases!

In recent years a third volunteer has been added

More than a third of volunteers are not church members and they soon become

rhyme and an 'out of this world' fashion parade from the shop's store of treasures – frilly dress, dinner suit, pyjama suit, belly dancing outfit (you'd better believe it!), Paul Hogan lookalike and wig and t-shirt combo. The birthday cake was decorated with op shop miniatures – scarves, buttons, dresses and shirts.

'Thanksgiving' was on Sunday, the theme of morning worship, praising God for the witness of this venture which has reached out to the local community, provided assistance for those in need, provided funds to sustain ministry and been a source of vitality for the congregation.

PEOPLE gathered at South Wharf, Docklands to join the Stop the Traffik Campaign - specifically calling for Toblerone to be a traffik-free chocolate bar.

The protest marked anti slavery day across the globe, so a group of Uniting Church, Salvos, (including small brass band) Baptists, Anglican and the Jewish Council of Women gathered together at the Mondeleze Australian Offices.

In the spirit of fun, music was played, juggling happened, a human Toblerone appeared before a presentation to Mondeleze representative, Simon Talbot, of thousands of signed postcards and 100 signed letters gathered by 15 year old Ben Lohning; accompanied by a heartfelt speech:

"As a young Australian I don't agree with human trafficking. I don't believe that anyone should be bought or sold. Unfortunately the chocolate industry uses child labour especially down the Ivory Coast. I want to be able to buy chocolate traffik free. You have the power to change that. Please make Toblerone traffik free and make Mondeleze a company that ethical young people can be proud of." It was a great start to the global campaign, with Mondeleze gracious in acceptance and open in discussing their own hopes for the future of ethical chocolate in Australia. It has been said that the people of Australia don't seem to care about where their chocolate comes from, but we encourage people to keep campaigning and working together against human trafficking.

It took just six weeks to get from an idea to her first sale, but Roselyn Gilmour's story is much bigger than that, as I found out at Heatherton-Dingley Uniting Church's recent market, writes Rev Steve Terrell.

Roselyn's working life includes being a nurse, a kinder teacher's assistant, a full-time mum and now a fully qualified pastry chef. She is also a member of Bayside Church, and after joining a small group study called 'Amazing Freedom' realised she had a passion to be creative with food. The disappointment of a friend who was gluten intolerant led to the idea of creating gluten free chocolate fudge Christmas cakes. Roselyn's now has a new business Kandy Cakes and her stall at Heatherton-Dingley was her first day of trading. The market itself is a response to exclusion, in fact. Karen

The market itself is a response to exclusion, in fact. Karen Frazer, who lives with disability, is also extremely talented at knitting fabric animals. Karen is a neighbour to Margaret Howse, another H-D member who, aware of Karen's difficulty in selling her knitted items, thought the idea of a market might help. The extra income could also help Karen make ends meet. It doesn't stop

there... Margaret has a passion for people in senior years, especially in aged care facilities. Many have had to leave their pet with someone else, and yet pets can be such an important

part of life for the elderly. Enter Karen's knitted creations, which she can make to resemble a loved pet! So they often find their way into someone's bedroom as a reminder of a loved pet who couldn't come and stay. Pets are big at Heatherton-Dingley. In November they held a Doggy Thanksgiving service. Back to the market. Having advertised in a seniors magazine, the stall holders share a remarkable theme. Most are raising money for a good cause. CWA is selling Devonshire teas. Parkdale UCA Craft Group is raising money for cancer research, having lost several

members to the disease. H-D members raise money for Sri Lanka, while Dot Plumber is selling copies of her children's book, which 'really is better read aloud' and writes hymns for the Doggy Thanksgiving too!

There are people who have just

started a hobby, perhaps in retirement. Another lady said her husband thought she was accumulating a lot of jewellery she had made, so she took out a stall and is selling the lot. She'll be back next year!

Margaret reckons it's a great way to raise money for the congregation. Table hire ranges from \$5-\$20 and the church also had a stall. It was easy to set up, and the car park has never been so full. But like most things, it's not really about the money or the produce, but the community and the stories of mission that could otherwise be lost in the rattle of small change.

A life well lived


Frank G Watson Engineer September 2, 1927 - October 11, 2013

he 30 million or so passengers who use the Melbourne Underground Rail Loop each year all benefit from the great engineering and project management skills of Frank Watson.

For Frank was the General Manager and Director of Engineering of the Melbourne Underground Rail Loop Authority (MURLA) from 1971 to 1983.

World War II

Frank George Watson was born in Boulder, Western Australia. He commenced his Diploma of Mechanical and Electrical Engineering at the Western Australian School of Mines in 1945 and by doing both the day and evening classes completed the course work in



two instead of three years. In place of doing his thesis, to complete his Diploma, he was appointed as a Lecturer in the Mathematics and Physics Department of the School, to help cope with the influx of students returning from World War II. Despite studying day and night, he still found time to gain a pilot's licence in 1947.

Service to Uniting Church

Frank came to Melbourne in 1948 to participate in the Government Aircraft Factory's Practical and Administrative Training Scheme. He was actively involved with Scots' Church in Melbourne where he met, and in 1951 married, Margaret Peacock. Margaret died in 2006, the same year that she was made a Member of the Order of Australia 'For service to the Uniting Church in Australia, particularly through a range of executive and representational roles both nationally and internationally, and to the ecumenical movement'.

The newly married couple moved to Tasmania in 1951 when Frank was employed by the Hydro Electric Commission which was rapidly expanding its hydro-electric installations. He found time to not only do a BA in Economics and Philosophy Whilst living in Kingston, south of Hobart, he and three friends purchased a property to enable the Presbyterian Church to establish the Kingston Youth Centre. He designed and supervised the construction of the main accommodation unit. This survived the disastrous 1967 bush fires and also record breaking hurricane force winds. The property is known as Rowallan Park and is now the Kingston Uniting Church.

Tunnelling

Frank's skills and expertise in tunnelling were recognised in 1971when he was appointed the General Manager and Director of Engineering of the newly formed MURLA. He subsequently was appointed to the Authority's Board. He was responsible for supervising and coordinating the planning, financing and construction of the Loop and then handing it over to Victorian Railways to operate. The Loop was opened in stages between 1981 and 1985. Queen Elizabeth II visited Museum Station during her 1980 tour of Australia. In his later years Frank proudly displayed the photo of him talking to Her Majesty during this visit. Frank and Margaret were both committed members of the Uniting Church.

St Luke's

Frank was an elder at the Ashburton Presbyterian Church then later at **St. Luke's Uniting Church, Mt Waverley.** He also served as Convenor of the Property Committee for Maroondah Presbytery. Frank celebrated 50 years as a lay preacher in 2006.

Family get togethers were a favourite activity, both in Melbourne and when travelling. He tried to attend every event in which a family member participated, be it choir concerts, field sports, car rallies, kayak relay marathons or theatre musicals.

Frank is survived by his two children, Jenny and Donald and his three grand-daughters.
