asset of our Synod and we appreciated her presentation very much.


Rev Adam McIntosh was also extremely informative and challenging with his work with congregations in the development of new expressions of church in Port Phillip West Presbytery.

Sign of the times...

Pope Francis is the most influential Twitter user – or 'tweep' - in the world, a new study has revealed. Although the Argentine Jesuit Pontiff is the second most followed world leader after Barack Obama, he outstrips the US President in 'retweets' of messages.

This makes him the most influential 'tweep' on the planet according to Twiplomacy 2014.

Of the two, the Pope enjoys greater global reach because of the support of his followers for his tweets, which most commonly include the words 'God', 'Jesus' and 'love'.

'By this standard, Pope Francis @Pontifex is by far the most influential tweep with more than 10,000 retweets on his Spanish account and 6,462 retweets on his English account,' the report said.

After Obama and Pope Francis, the third most followed world leader is Indonesian President Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono who has five million followers.

The Bunun are coming....

IF you haven't heard Bunun singers and watched their dancing then you're in for a treat this September.

As a Bunun indigenous troupe of songsters in their traditional dress and singing their traditional songs will perform four concerts in Victoria in September.

The Bunun tribe are a mountain people from southern Taiwan and are one of fourteen indigenous tribes in Taiwan numbering half a million in Taiwan's population of twenty three million. This troupe of songsters are being sponsored by the Australian Welsh Male Choir(AWMC) and will perform at Ringwood UCA, Frankston High St UCA, Beaumaris UCA and in the Wangaratta Anglican cathedral in September. The AWMC will share the concert program

at Ringwood Sat Sept 13th @7:00,pm, Frankston High St Sunday 14th @ 2:30pm and Beaumaris UCA on Saturday September 20th at 7:00pm and Wangaratta Anglican Cathedral on Sunday September 21st at 2:00pm on these 'not to be missed ' concert occasions .



The Bunun young people who will be visiting us are senior high school and university students who will be in Australia for ten days at the invitation of the Mayor of Frankston city and the AWMC. They come from the Bunun Cultural and Educational Foundation(BCEF) an outreach program associated with the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan (PCT) one of the partner churches of the Uniting Church. Taiwan is 96% Buddhist and 4% Christian , but the indigenous population has embraced the Christian faith with great enthusiasm. These tribal people

are like many indigenous populations across the world, exploited, abused, discriminated against and suffering from alcoholism and domestic violence. We warmly welcome these young people for whom this cross cultural experience will help them and us to a greater understanding of our very different cultures.

Director, Victorian Children's Aid Society, in the 1970s, Children's Bureau of Australia (NCBA), for 10 years; Life Member, 1990. Life Member (OzChild) Children Australia. Planned Giving Officer, Wesley College, since 2007. Board Member, Mayflower Aged Care, in the late 1990s.

Member, Rotary Club of Moorabin; served as President.

Board Member, Child Care Services, Presbyterian and Methodist Churches Tasmania, 1972. Editor, quarterly newsletter, St John's Uniting Church Cowes, ongoing.

Awards/recognition include: Father of the Year, Father's Day Council of Victoria, 1972.

Landmark half-century for church saved through sharing

THE 50th anniversary of the first Methodist service at Karingal High School was celebrated by the Combined Congregation of Karingal Uniting Church and St Peters Lutheran Church recently, writes Keith Pyke.

On Sunday, May 4 members past and present joined forces for the half-century landmark occasion - including foundation member Shirley Cleave (then Shirley May.) She spoke of the early days in the High School Art Room from 1964 before she, husband Jock and others pushed for the building of the Church House that was opened in 1968 and for the current Church opened in 1974. Paul Matthews said that the Church House (next

to the Church) was both Manse and Worship Centre, one of the few such projects of the Methodist Church. He remembered when there were 100 children in the Sunday School and the purchase in 1973 of a 'Chair-O-Plane' from the former Whistle-Stop entertainment centre on Skye Road. It was rejuvenated and then hired out to many local School Fetes as a fundraiser for the new

church.

Aileen Gilchrist and Moira Logan both recalled that Karingal has always been an "inclusive"
Congregation (there were members from eight denominations, even before Union), attributing much credit to the late Rev Beverley
Bellinger in the 1980s. Karingal was where "different things happened". At least four former members have been ordained in the Uniting Church and two have been Presbytery Chairpersons. They also shared memories of earlier times, including

the commencement of the Karingal Uniting Church Monthly Market in 1991 (still part of the social fabric of the Community, a wonderful "outreach" venture and a great source of income for the Church.) In 1994 Karingal became a one congregation parish and as it decreased it was reduced to part time Ministry, a situation that continued until some seemingly unrelated events (some

believe an Act of God) took place less than one kilometre away.

In 2000, St Peters Lutheran Congregation sold their Church building in Derna

Crescent to the developers of a shopping centre and in 2001 they commenced

Worship Services, also with part


time ministry, in the Karingal Uniting Church. A letter from the Uniting Church to the Lutheran Church in October 2001 stated that:

"We envisage that we can extend our sharing beyond simply the use of the building facilities and that our two Congregations may be able to worship together."

There was no previous example of Uniting Church and Lutheran Congregations sharing in Victoria, but since October 2002 they have worshipped together with one full time Pastor. It's success is due to the motivation coming from the members. This 'sharing' has been extended recently by a

Nuer speaking Sudanese Fellowship that conducts weekly Lutheran Services, except for Sundays, when a Combined Service is held.

Following the Celebratory Worship, a delicious Morning Tea was shared and all inspected an extensive display of photographs and other Memorabilia. Everyone sang 'Happy Birthday' and Shirley cut the cake.
