Churches unite on critical community issues

YOUNG Luke Batty's image beamed out on the big screen as his mother Rosie delivered a heartfelt plea for change to the many lives which are damaged by deaths such as Luke's.

Luke lost his life at the hands of his depressed and psychologically disturbed father during a cricket training session in Tyabb earlier this year.
Rosie was speaking at a Family Violence Forum held in September at the Peninsula Community Theatre - an inspiring and informative event which was spearheaded by an ecumenical initiative led by St Mark's Mornington UC - called Peninsula Voice Inc.

It is this groundbreaking partnership work that led to St Mark's scooping joint first place in the Uniting Church 2014 Ecumenical Awards, presented at the recent VicTas Synod meeting.

Peter Orton, of St Mark's, explains: "Peninsula Voice was created seven months ago, through a conversation between St Marks and the Mornington Churches of Christ. Our conversation centred on the fact there were many important community issues that were not being discussed in any depth, as the 24/7 news cycle does not always allow for this." The momentum quickly spread. St Peter's Anglican and St Macartan's Catholic church joined the group. Then Mornington Shire came on board, along with



support from Mornington and Mt Martha Ministers Fellowship.

The local newspaper covered the Family Violence Forum, saying: 'The theatre was bulging to capacity with more than 540 people eager to attend, many standing. There were moments where it was difficult to see a dry eye; senior police included.'

Peninsula Voice Inc. is now regularly contacted to provide a comment on community and social issues by the local newspaper and opinion pages.

Peter Orton, pictured right, concludes: "We think, on the important issues, the community should drive the agenda and decide what is important and then move towards this, not just react to the results. "It was very encouraging for Peninsula Voice to win the Uniting Church 2014 Ecumenical Award (shared) citation acknowledging the community work by the local Mornington churches. These types of awards are important, as they focus parishioners on the need for Christian churches to work together to expand Gods kingdom."

The reason for the Seasons


THE Coatesville Uniting Church in Bentleigh East has had a long history of openness to innovation.

The church enjoys a worshipping culture that encourages creativity and a deep sense of exploration of its calling within the community. Just over 12 months ago, the church launched its own program to complement its call to reflection, prayer and mission. Called **Seasons**, the program is quite simple, but has realised quite amazing outcomes in knowledge, mission, creativity, action and prayer. Using the various seasons of the year as its centrepiece, we dedicate each season to focus on an area of need. "Winter 2013 saw us (in addition to our usual activities), focussing on the subject of Healing" explains program author Peter Heazlewood. "During that season, we committed to informing ourselves about issues of healing,

creative exercises on the theme, identifying mission activities around healing and engaging in prayer for healing in our community and across the world." Resource material is distributed to the various groups across the church, with encouragement for each group to engage the process to the extent that they chose. Activities including prayer are in the hands of each group, as well as being incorporated as part of general worship. As such, there is a community immersion in a particular theme. To date. Coatesville UCA has worked through seasons of Healing, Hope, Light and Homelessness. We are currently working through a season of Peace. Mission outcomes have been quite amazing. 








Searching at Synod... THIS year's Synod meeting saw thought-provoking issues discussed, reconciliation from past hurts and exploration of the future for the Uniting Church. Powerful stuff. The main 'news' items had to be: our troubled relationship with ACCESS Ministries and, by inference, the future of religious education in schools; and developments regarding the Major Strategic Review of the UCA VicTas.



For me, however, one of the most important areas for discussion was the question of: 'What is the 'new normal' for church?'

Times have changed and the future of the church means different

things for many different people. Working groups explored how to build on 'signs of hope' and face new challenges rather than perhaps viewing church life as a matter of 'survival.'

Two speakers epitomised these ideas: Revs Kerrie Graham – marking 50 years in ministry - and Rev Randall Prior – retiring as Principal of the Centre for Theology & Ministry. Very stimulating speeches. Randall Prior's speech was spellbinding and he received a standing ovation. I hope it is available on video somewhere.

Kerrie Graham, who spoke brilliantly at the Tribute service to remember minister's who had passed on and 'milestone' anniversaries of current ministers - 50, 60 and even 70 years since ordination. Kerrie recalled all 29 candidates in his ordination year were 'men being assessed by men' and 'thankfully that has changed.' He said it had been an exciting time for the Church in terms of membership growth, something which has sadly not continued.

Yet he was far from downcast about the future of the church. It has seen many paradigm shifts: the Apostolic age to the fall of the Roman Empire, the Mediaeval Church, the Reformation and the Modern

church... now we are at the cusp of a new 'paradigm.' Kerrie ended with wise words, however: "God evaluates not according to success; but faithfulness. The bush is burning, not extinguished and, best of all, God is with us."

What Synod decided... UNITING CHURCH OUTLINES FIVE REQUESTS FOR ONGOING **SUPPORT OF ACCESS ministries**



The Uniting Church in Australia Synod of Victoria and Tasmania has resolved to issue five requests to ACCESS ministries, and if not satisfied with evidence of a positive response, will withdraw as a Supporting Church from 1 July 2015.

The consequence of the Synod decision is that ACCESS ministries has 8 months to demonstrate positive responses to the following requests in order for the Church to retain its Supporting Church status:

- 1. A commitment to changes in the governance practices and structures that facilitate the full participation of members of the Council of Christian Education in Schools (trading as ACCESS ministries) in the policy development and direction setting of ACCESS ministries.
- 2. Increased and transparent communications with the General Secretary of the Uniting Church Synod of Victoria and Tasmania.
- 3. An inclusive and consultative approach to the development of the Special Religious Instruction (SRI) program materials, a commitment that these materials will be theologically broad and pedagogically sound and that this is reflected in the training of SRI instructors.
- 4. The removal of the compulsory nature of the Partnership Program payment.
- 5. A conversation with the UCA Centre for Theology and Ministry (CTM) about the possibility of the CTM's involvement in the training of SRI instructors.

The Synod also sought to affirm, acknowledge and thank Uniting Church members whose dedication over many years contributes to the work of ACCESS ministries and its predecessors as CRE teachers, members, Council members and Board members.

Uniting Church SRI instructors will continue to be affirmed and supported by the Church.

The Uniting Church is deeply committed to ongoing engagement with other faith traditions and for young people to be exposed to a well structured pedagogically sound general religious education program in the Australian curriculum. As a result, the Synod, in the same resolution, also resolved to request two bodies within the Church (the Commission for Mission and the Centre for Theology and Ministry) to actively work for the inclusion of General Religious Education (GRE) in schools.

This resolution is the culmination of three years of investigation by a task group of the Church, examining a number of aspects of Christian education in schools, with particular focus on the governance, SRI program materials and instruction and communication by ACCESS ministries.

Leighmoor Uniting Church will be celebrating our 160th anniversary of Worship at 189 Wickham Road, Moorabbin this year, writes Erica Fox.





Come and meet The RUGMAKER from MAZAR-E-SHARIF

Najaf Mazari fled, Northern Afghanistan in 2001 after being tortured and narrowly escaping certain death during the genocide of Hazara men in Mazar-E-Sharif by the Taliban.

Reluctantly leaving behind his wife and 6-month-old baby, he made the dangerous journey overland, eventually crossing the ocean to the shores of Australia where he ended up in the Woomera Detention Centre. In April 2007, he was granted Australian citizenship.

He wrote the book, The Rugmaker of Mazar e Sharif which sold 50,000 copies and was a VCE required text for four years.

"Why did my troubles catch the eye of God? It is a puzzle that can never be answered".

"Australia," he says, "is a land that I love in the way that a man loves the friend who saved his life."

He says that he continually wonders why he has been so lucky; "chosen to prosper":
