GROWTH, connections and diversity were all celebrated in the service of induction for Rev Hoon You as minister of the South Port Parish Mission. Port Melbourne Congregation.

These themes were identified as the congregation gathered in the community garden beside the church recognizing that place as a point of connection between

the congregation and the broader community. The garden also reminded us of our connections with Earth and that in the midst of all our diversity we were one within the grace of God who sustains and nurtures

us all. As we celebrated this new beginning in the ministry in which we all share Hoon, together with representatives of the Presbytery, the congregation and the UnitingCare kindergarten which was located on the property planted a seed in a pot. The congregation then processed into the church building to continue the service, recognizing that the building had recently celebrated its 150th anniversary. The theme of seeds continued through the service with a challenging sermon on the Parable of the Sower delivered by Rev Liz McMillan (Presbytery Minister: Pastoral Care) and the song "Seeds" composed by Allan Hoare, a member of the congregation,

with seeds being distributed to the congregation during Hoon's response. In his response Hoon reminded the congregation that life and growth only comes as the seed is buried deep in the soil and that in the same way

> the whole congregation was called to surrender itself to the calling and grace of God's mission to the Port Melbourne area.

As well as members of the congregation and Presbytery the service was supported by members of the Parish Mission, by the South Port Singers who sang during the service, by representatives of Hoon's previous ministry with Monash Uniting Church and Monash University and by many members of the Korean community. Hoppers are crispy, bowl-shaped pancakes made with rice flour. They aren't easy to make as they need a special hopper pan to create them. This is an almost circular bowl and they are cooked on a gas jet. They are, however, one of the great traditions of Sri Lankan food.

They can be:

- Savoury plain and add your choice of curries (mild or milder??)
- Savoury with an egg poached in the bottom
- Sweet with a delicate sweet lining in the base

It is fascinating to see them made "whilst you wait" so come and see the hoppers being cooked in front of you – they are delicious and highly recommended.

The Beginning of the Gospel: Mark and Christian Faith Today

Key changes include:



Reflections on Faith

Taking his cue from the day's gospel where Jesus asked the Pharisees whether it was lawful to heal a sick person on the Sabbath, Pope Francis reflected on love and justice being the path to Christ rather than an excessive attachment to the laws.

"This way of living attached to the laws, distanced them from love and justice. They followed the laws and neglected justice. They followed the laws and neglected love. And for these people Jesus had only one word: hypocrites. Closed-minded men, who are so attached to the letter of

the law that they were always closing the doorway to hope, love and salvation... Men who only knew how to close (doors)."

Quoting from St Paul, Pope Francis said the path towards being faithful to the laws, without neglecting justice and love is the opposite: from love to integrity, from love to discernment, from love to the laws. "This is the path that Jesus teaches us, totally opposite to that of the doctors of law. And it's this path from love and justice that leads to God. Instead, the other path, of being attached only to the laws, to the letter of the laws, leads to closure, leads to egoism, the arrogance



of considering oneself to be in the right, to that socalled holiness of appearances, right? Jesus said to these people: You like to be seen by the people as men of prayer and of fasting...:' To be seen, right? The Pope said these are the two different paths and Jesus shows us the right one.

"Jesus draws close to us: his closeness is the real proof that we are proceeding along the true path. That's because it's the path which God has chosen to save us: through his closeness. God was made man like one of us and we must make ourselves like the others, the needy, those who need our help."

He concluded, Jesus' flesh is the bridge that brings us closer to God and not the letter of the law. I hope that these examples of Jesus's love and closeness can help us from sliding into hypocrisy because a hypocritical Christian is a bad thing.

THE yarn art project is going well in the Chelsea Parish with the blue offerings being installed at each of the three churches – Carrum, Edithvale and Chelsea, writes Rev Claire Dawe.

Check if telecom changes could affect your congregation


CHANGES to the Telecommunications Act mean you will not be able to use a radio mic, instrument transmitter or in ear monitoring system that operates between 695 and 820Mhz after January 1st 2015.

Why the change?

- •The spectrum between 694 and 820MHz has been allocated for use by the telecommunications section.
- •It becomes illegal in less than 90 days and strict penalties can be applied by the Australian

Communication and Media Authority for breaches. What you need to do?

- •Check to see if your existing devices operate between 520 - 694MHz or 1790 - 1800MHz. If so, you can continue to use these devices. You will find this information on the device or in the owners manual.
- •If your product operates between 695-820MHz you need to decommission them and replace with compliant products


'Great to have you here in Tennessee,' the stranger said. 'What do you do for a living?' 'I teach at a seminary,' he replied.
