'Love for all. Hatred for none' is the message of peace from Ahmadiyya Muslims to Mornington churches

MORNINGTON is rapidly becoming the groundbreaking, ecumenical, social justice capital of the Port Phillip East Presbytery - and strengthening community links in the process. Hot on the heels of scooping an ecumenical award at the 2014 Synod meeting St Mark's UC, Mornington and several local churches then held a forum on domestic violence that included invited speakers the likes of Rosie Batty - recently voted Australian of the Year on Australia Day. Without letting the grass grow under their feet this same group hosted 40 guests from the Women's Auxiliary of Ahmadiyya Muslim Association, whose mosque is in Langwarrin, to enjoy the hospitality shown by 40 women from four of the local Christian churches in Mornington - St Peter's Anglican Church, Mornington Church of Christ, St Macartan's Catholic Church, and St Mark's Uniting Church. Leader of the local organising group, Christine Manktelow from St Peter's Anglican Church, said in her introduction: "The women gathered here all share faith in God, though we each practice our faith in different ways. We hope that this gathering will give us the opportunity to grow in our



understanding of each other, to find ways of bridging our differences, and to develop warm and friendly relationships. With goodwill, much can be achieved." Responding to the welcome, Women's Auxiliary President, Kaukab Nasir, provided a short explanation about Ahmadiyya Muslim Association. She spoke about the liberal and tolerant teachings of Islam which they follow. Kaukab very clearly and strongly stated that terrorism and extremist actions have no place in true Islam.

The motto of Ahmadiyya Muslim Association is 'Love

for all. Hatred for none'.

All of the women joined hands around the room, in the spirit of shared friendship and love of neighbour. The Muslim women then provided a glimpse of their worship practices, reciting text from the Quran, and singing a religious song. In response, the Christian women joined together singing 3 hymns.

A time for questions was provided, and a panel of Muslim and

and comments. In such a safe and friendly environment, many welcomed the opportunity to increase their knowledge, and even to ask about the beautiful clothing worn by the Muslim women under their modest outer coats and head coverings. Margaret Mitchell from St Mark's was one of many local women who showed the visitors around St Mark's church, explaining various aspects of the building, decorations, and Christian worship traditions. She says: "It was a great privilege to talk about things that are dear to my heart, to a group of women who were hearing these things for the first time.

"Sharing afternoon tea, which was provided by all the women themselves, was an opportunity for the guests to talk freely. The conversations were animated and meaningful as the women made a sincere effort to build connections, understanding and tolerance. The new connections between women from the local Christian churches are sure to grow and develop. As the afternoon tea drew to a close, amid the happy noise of 80 women talking, those who had participated agreed that they



had shared a very special experience. Offering thanks on behalf of the Muslim women guests, Kaukab adds: "We appreciate the work and effort that goes into organising such a program,





History in the making - quilters design wartime masterpiece

A PATCHWORK and quilting group has produced a Gallipoli triptych that is so spell-binding that it is to tour all the RSL branches in Victoria.

CUPS (Cranbourne Uniting Patchworkers) formed the Combined Cranbourne Quilters with St John's Anglican Church, Cranbourne and the Tooradin Anglican Church Quilters plus some local ladies, to make a large Anzac Centenary 2015 Triptych (3 Quilted banners together finishing about 5 m x 2 1/2m) for display in the Cranbourne RSL building.

Designed by Artistic Director Rev Wendy Snook, pictured, it has taken a team of about 12 ladies five months to complete the backgrounds, which together form the picture of Anzac Cove and the hills of Gallipoli. They are made up of about 4,888 x 2 inch individual cotton fabric squares, placed individually on a fusible base in a watercolour technique, see inset. The method was taught to the team by Rev Wendy. Appliquéd figures of Anzac soldiers, sailors, ships, submarine, small boats and other items will be added. Mr Anthony Byrne MP and the Federal Government of Veterans Affairs have offered us a grant to help pay for the materials. The Dandenong -Cranbourne RSL Social Welfare Committee and the State RSL representative are so pleased with it, they suggested that it will be toured around all the RSL branches in the state during 2015 before it returns to the Cranbourne RSL. Also the quilters

would like to display it in a national quilt show in April

prior to Anzac Day, but that is to be confirmed. All the team, and particularly Rosemary Kreun, Dianne Mitchell, and Lorraine Jacques are to be congratulated for their good work, and we hope

that many people will have an opportunity to see the Anzac Centenary Triptych quilts when they are finished.



This is a real demonstration of how the lessons of the past can inform our lives today and ensure that everyone works together to create a safer, better future.
