Bill reflects on church life as he chalks up 70 years since ordination - in his 99th year

THERE aren't many people that can say they have dedicated 70 years of their life to one vocation or calling - or to reach their 99th birthday for that matter.

One such stalwart is Rev Bill Morgan, writes Rev Neil Peters.

To mark his momentous achievements family and friends joined the congregation at Glen Waverley Uniting Church on April 26 to recognize and celebrate 70 years - to the day - of ordination to the ministry in the Presbyterian and Uniting Church. Bill, who turns 100 in October, is still active in ministry offering pastoral care in the village where he lives, leading some village and nursing home services, and occasionally filling in to preach or preside at communion at nearby congregations. Bill was recognized for his leadership of church and worship, his passion for preaching, and the wonderful pastoral care he has offered people over the decades. To this day Bill is committed to supporting the mission of the church.

Bill was invited in the service to reflect on a few highlights of his ministry. One particular opportunity and privilege was to serve for two terms in Vanuatu. He found the people had a real openness to faith, and Bill said he would never forget his final service in Vanuatu. More than 1,000 people attended, many having to sit out on the lawns, and there was not enough communion wine. Bill said it was very humbling.

Bill also served as moderator of the Presbyterian Church. He said "I will always remember the installation service. Coming forward before so many people and knowing I had their support and prayers".

Another highlight for Bill was successfully guiding the Presbyterian Church in Ormond into Union to create the Uniting Church. There were divided views among



but he put in place a process of information sharing, studying the Basis of Union and a debate with speakers for and against,

all but one family made the

transition into the Uniting Church.

Bill has served in ministry at Clare SA, Malvern as assistant, Trafalgar, Shepparton, chaplain at Scotch in Tasmania and Ormond. Those present at the service at Glen Waverley joined in prayer giving thanks to God for Bill's 70 years of ordination.





"Where there is love there is life..."

"IT'S not about right or left, it's about right and wrong."

This is the non-violent battlecry of the Love Makes a Way pressure group campaigning to free all children from refugee detention centres. It's not about politics, it's about people.Rev Cameron McAdam, of Mt Eliza Village Uniting Church, Rev John Haig, of St Mark's Mornington UC, and Rev Paul Chalson, of Mt Martha UC, along with 30 other Christians staged a Love Makes a Way prayer vigil at the office of Greg Hunt, Flinders Liberal MP, recently. This is the twentieth such vigil across Australia.

"We had two demands," says Cameron. "The first was a commitment from Greg Hunt to talk to the prime minister and the cabinet about a moratorium on any further transfers of asylum seekers to Nauru or Manus Island. The second was to ask for the immediate release of

all children into the community on the mainland. That's 227 children – not a huge ask."

After more than six hours in the MPs office and two telephone discussions with Mr Hunt, in Canberra that day, the seven who staged the official sit-in were evicted by local police.

the attention of the Immigration Minister Peter Dutton and senior government officials by Greg Hunt that same day was fantastic," adds Cameron.

"I think this action demonstrated how committed we are as a church to taking positive action on human rights

issues. In fact, it felt similar to the early church in that we are being persecuted - justly - through the Royal Commission inquiry so we need to draw down and down to change views on Christianity and get serious about who we are. Following the likes of Martin Luther King, Desmond Tutu and Ghandi."

The social media coverage and political reactions brought more pressure on authorities on an issue where MPs have largely paid lip service to more staid methods of protest, such as letter-writing and making an appointment to talk to their MP

"Everything ended in peaceful, respectful interaction between the group, police and office staff in what was a non-violent protest," continues Cameron. "I feel really good about that. Love Makes a Way will continue to put pressure on the government, nevertheless."

Dramatic developments at St John's


TREADING the boards will bring church to life for young - and the young at heart - at St John's Elsternwick.

For the Glen Huntly Road church is embarking on two fresh new programmes, and invites people from the Presbytery to come along. Glen Eira City Council has an annual Storytelling Festival (June 11-28 in 2015). This year St. John's will be on the official program with two performances of "THE TRAVELLING"

PARABLES SHOW" on Saturdays, June 13th and June 27th at 2pm.

St. John's minister, Rev Philip Liebelt, an experienced storyteller, will be joined by his acting and musical sons, Dustin and Ty, as they tell stories and sing of journeys. Parables have a gentle message woven through the text of the story. This collection tells of journeys, short and long, set in a range of different countries and cultures; some are silly, some sombre, even sacred. Inviting thinking about the journey of life.

Then, in July St. John's welcomes the first FRESH Youth Theatre for Social Change in the area. FRESH, a not-for-profit organisation set up by active Christian professionals in performing arts and social



work, has been operating for 10+ years, and has theatres based at Manningham (UCA), Blackburn and Bayswater.

During the 15 week program, 10-18 year old particticipants will do a range of theatre games and activities, and rehearse a script that revolves around issues of relevance to young people, culminating in a three performance season. There is no evangelistic endeavour, but pastoral care is an important part of the program, through a weekly segment and they have a meal together. A core aim is to teach respect and grace. Because of this focus on helping young people the aim is to have 50-60% of young people who are referred by schools and agencies as having particular needs or issues in their lives and who would be helped by such a

programme. A team of experienced theatre and social work people lead the programme working with the local church. Three decades of diversity - UCA champions the cross-cultural cause

THE year 2015 celebrates 30 years since the Uniting Church declared itself to be a Multicultural Church the first denomination in Australia to do so. The Synod of Victoria held an Intercultural Service of Celebration at Glen Waverley Uniting Church on Saturday 23rd May 2015 to recognise this milestone. It was coordinated by Rev Dev Anandarajan, Cross Cultural Mission & Ministry Resource and Development officer at Synod – but there was a strong Presbytery of Port Philip East influence as many of the culturally specific congregations in the Synod are based in our Presbytery.

Prior to the service there were delicacies for purchase

from the Caulfield Indonesian congregation, the Korean Church Melbourne (Malvern) and the Vietnamese congregation (Footscray) ably assisted by the NextGen members across the Synod.

The sanctuary was draped with an imaginative display featuring symbols from different cultures depicting their heritage before Christianity, what changed when the Gospel arrived and

something indicative of their culture today.

This was coordinated by Rev Eseta Meneilly with contributions from many different cultures and people across the Synod.

The official party entered the church

to the tune of the didgeridoo played by some of our first peoples who had a yarn about their heritage and culture before performing two traditional dances - a welcoming dance and the brolga dance. Rev Ken Sumner, UIACC,











welcomed those present to the land of his ancestors on behalf of the local Elders. More than 14 different languages were used in the service

including the First Peoples

IMAGINE that ... above the celebration to mark 30 years of cultural diversity in UCA. The service included an indigenous welcome to country, choir items, and a multicultural luncheon/ afternoon tea. The story even hit the Waverley Leader newspaper

and English. Prayers – even responsive ones – were delivered in many different languages and the congregation was encouraged to use their mother tongue as all prayers were translated into more than 12

different languages. Many choirs and cultures shared their traditional singing with the congregation invited to join in where appropriate. All had English translations.

But what about the guiet times, the desert places when nothing like this is available? Will there be spiritual wisdom available from what has been learned and remembered. Memory is important for our mental and spiritual health. Wisely the Psalmist reminds us to "Write down for the coming generation what the Lord has done ..." And that includes what is stored in our minds there to be prompted by the Spirit. The benefits of Oral Tradition. We often visited a lovely Christian gentleman, a WW2 Digger, suffering from dementia. Sometimes at our greeting he opened his eyes, then drifted back to sleep. Sitting quietly, chatting, a prayer, some reading was the pattern. No response. One afternoon we tried this, singing (not well) "Onward Christian soldiers marching as to war ...". He opened his eyes and joined in, word for word. Then he went back to sleep. Not in TiS that word, but forever in his mind and heart. We left with a warm feeling.

Reflection. Lord, thank you for our minds and memory. Thank you for the treasure of our scriptures. All the wisdom of the ages. Thank you for family Bibles, Church Bibles and the work of the Gideons in making Bibles available in schools, hotels and motels for travellers to read. Amen by Bill Pugh







HAPPY Anniversary to the Uniting Church in Australia – 38 years on June 22nd.

Greeted by a selection of Sound of Music costumes - we had to change our own image and hear the many

changes in the early life of the real Maria (not Julie Andrews) on whom the film is based.

Born Maria Kutschera, she was

born on a train and delivered by the conductor - a great start in life. Her mother died when she was three, her father died when she was nine and she was left to a violent uncle to care for her. She ran away as

a teenager to Vienna and entered the Benedictine Convent in Salzburg at 19. She was sent to tutor a child of the Baron George Von Trapp, a widowed navy officer with seven children. He was a musical man and very kind. Maria wasn't the sweet governess like in the film but married the Baron and ran the family with strict discipline. Later having another three children.

They didn't escape over the mountains, but caught a train to Switzerland and then a ship to America. The Baron lost all his money in a banking collapse so Maria organised stage performances of the Trapp Family singers and running music camps in their home. The Baron later died and she took her three youngest children to Papua New Guinea and worked as a missionary! What a life...

We then discussed changes in our lives - early upbringing, depression years (hard on families), current lifestyles, changes in careers or husbands' careers, overseas living and bringing up children in another country, new churches and then discussed 'do we really welcome a newcomer to our church?' We continued chatting over morning tea with the Sound of Music in the background! Our group meets the first Friday in the month, usually at church, and a member arranges the discussion and morning tea. All welcome. by Wendy Hinde
