

Peninsula prayer vigil shows solidarity

Peaceable, yet determined for justice, the Asylum Seeker Prayer Vigil brought together people from all walks of life to voice their feelings of despair with current Australian policies on refugee issues and offshore detention centres.

Berlin Guerrero, himself a one-time refugee fleeing religious persecution in the Philippines, told his story to show a truer picture behind asylum seeking. Stating most, like him, would prefer to stay in their own country but have been forced out in terrifying circumstances. Revs Paul Chalson, Cameron McAdam and John Haig addressed the crowd with prayers, reflections and calls for wisdom and righteousness to be shown to those fearful enough to leave their homeland for safer shores.

Jake Doleschal shared the Love Makes a Way philosophy and a haunting musical duet by two young adults paved the way for pictorial projections of media images with many members of the audience compelled to speak



prayers for justice for refugees and their children and for God's love to prevail.





Parting gift is no secret



Gaining an experience of God

RE-IMAGINING Church is one of the first educational events to come out of the new Mission Development Committee - and it proved to be highly successful and stimulating for those who attended.

It was held at Noble Park at the end of May, writes Ian Savage, Chaplain at Prahran Mission.

I was intrigued by the flyer but had other commitments. However after an e-mail from Prahran Mission CEO I rescheduled my commitments and went along. And I am glad I did.

The seminar was led by father and son team Greg and Steve Rose and based on PhD research by Greg - a retired Churches of Christ minister. He asked: "How is it that some churches led by ministers with no theological training thrive and other churches led by theologically educated ministers fail to thrive?"

We began the workshop by entering the world of our own experience and sharing

our stories. We were asked to choose

Until the early 1960s decision making by church members and society in general would have be guided by traditional authority - 'we have always done it this way' or rational legal authority 'what does the rule book say?'

Today we tend to make decisions based on charismatic or experiential authority 'this feels right

to me' Worship has changed from a focus on understanding (what does the Bible say? how should we behave?) to a focus on experience (helping people gain an

experience of God).
Greg and Steve helped us consider how to

shift our models of worship and preaching so that we can reflect this new emphasis in our own worship and preaching.

The new emphasis on experience calls for new forms of guidance and new safeguards - a focus on discernment. The congregation needs to ask: "What is the Spirit saying?" and congregation leaders need to listen to wise, grounded counsel.

In closing, Greg challenged us to affirm our past yet move beyond it. The Spirit is calling us to share the Mission of God!

Angie aged with us. One day she could not carry on – crippled, tired, out of breath. The vet said it was



Abdi Aden's world fell apart when he was only fifteen and Somalia's vicious civil war hit Mogadishu.

Unable to find his family and effectively an orphan, Abdi survived daily violence, death squads and starvation. After almost four months he reached Kenya.

He was just seventeen years old when he arrived in Melbourne after journeying through Romania and Germany. He had no English, no family or friends, no money, no home. Yet, Abdi went on to complete postgraduate qualifications in adolescent mental health and was acknowledged with the 2007 Victorian Refugee Recognition Award. Abdi also featured in the SBS second series of *Go Back to Where You Came From*.

As one church door closes...

WHEN Flinders Church was sold, much of the furniture went to the new chapel at Merricks Camp - with pews finding a home in the chapel and the much-used lectern in their hall.

So, on Sunday May 24 about 40 members from Southern Mornington Peninsula UC met at the current church to car-pool across to Merricks North to visit the UCA camp facilities at Merricks Lodge. Church Council had also given \$30,000 to the camp to further meet their needs, and this was put towards a hydraulic lift to enable people with mobility difficulties to access the swimming pool for a fuller and more complete camping experience.

As we drove up the driveway into the property there were ooh's and aah's from within our car-pool at the green and spacious surrounds which greeted us. A large well prepared oval, basketball court, a three swimming

pool complex and lake, outdoor recreational and BBQ facilities all among bush and wetland walks. Idyllic!

We were met by Tiffany Jukes, Campsite Manager,

who greeted us warmly and outlined the camp layout, programmes and activities. Tiffany introduced team members, Justin Ballingal, Operations Manager, and Colin Austin, Catering Manager who we have to thank for the delicious afternoon tea we later enjoyed.

After a tour of the camp; with dormitory style sleeping, dining, recreation facilities and outdoor areas, we gathered around the

pool. Justin called for a volunteer to help him demonstrate the new hoist. Jill Fearon bravely stepped forward, with Charnize holding her hand for support! Together they sat on the seat as Justin worked the controls and swung them out across the expanse of water to loud calls from onlookers for Justin to press the "down, down, down" button. However Jill and Charnize were safely returned to dry ground.

We then quietly gathered around the plaque as



Chris outlined the history of the Flinders Church and acknowledgment of the facilities, staff and volunteers in providing such a place of recreation and renewall

He then introduced Mary Broughton. Mary, pictured below, is a very young 99 year old founder member of the Flinders Church who joined us with her son Tony, and Kevin Woods, who spoke warmly of his time at Flinders UC.

Mary assisted with the Bible reading and continued with thanks for the generosity and commitment of those who enabled the donation towards this equipment for a more inclusive and accessible experience for all. The plague was then unveiled.

We quietly moved across to the chapel with comments on how 'at home' the Flinders pews and furniture looked there. Afternoon tea gave us the opportunity to chat and reflect on the afternoon's

experience. For me the occasion had a personal impact as it was 12 months since the death of my son Stuart. I warmly pictured him being lifted from his wheelchair, transferred to the hoist and lowered into the soothing water to be free for a short time from the restrictions his condition imposed. His face would have exploded with an enormous grin and exclamations of sheer delight, his eyes bright with the sparkle for which he was known.

This highlighted for me the magnitude of the legacy from Flinders Church and Church Council in providing such a gift. It is a wonderful practical commitment to our mission and will give enormous pleasure and expand many young people's experiences of feeling included and accepted. On behalf of the SMPUC and past Flinders UC, thank you to the team of dedicated workers at Merricks Lodge who strive to make this possible. I felt we all gained personally from the experience.

Connections' South Eastern Chances is changing such stories with an innovative scholarship program that provides financial support to young people, like Amir, living in Melbourne's southeast, to obtain educational, cultural and social opportunities

that would otherwise be unavailable to them.

Amir, arrived in Australia five years ago and dreamed of being a doctor. So sure of



what his future looked like, Amir completed three year 12 subjects in year 11 with limited English. However, as the years went on, he became uncertain about his future as he soon realised he could not afford a number of essential items. Unfortunately, for many young people who face significant hardship, this is their reality. Many young people in our local community are unable to reach

their full potential because their financial situation is causing them to fall through the cracks.

It is important that every young person can imagine what their future might look like to develop their self-esteem and sense of hope. It is also important they feel supported and have the right networks that believe in them, networks that will help them reach these dreams. Never is this more important than for a young person who has experienced significant disadvantage in their early years.


