Mandala message

NEW ideas are bubbling across the presbytery to reveal to passers-by that their view of church may actually be very different than the reality.

This was the thinking by St Martins UCA when they began to use a window on the street for some imagery to signal that there is life within and things change and evolve.

"Come," says the window, "be curious, have a wondering about this church and its people." Says Tricia Graham: "I had recently attended the Sacred Edge Festival at Queenscliffe and came back invigorated and inspired. Our Mandala Project was a direct lift from this festival and I wanted to give it a go. There was enthusiasm for it within the congregation. I was hoping that if we set it up in the window there would be an interest from without in watching it grow. I also hoped that as well as our congregation participating, that other users of the buildings, like the calesthenics group and the mother's group, would take an active part."

During the collection of the materials, Tricia visited a local Indian shop to purchase lentils and grains of different colours to use on the mandala.

"I spoke to him of what we were doing and he immediately gave me a free packet of lentils and a blessing from his Hindu tradition to the people of our church for our project," Tricia adds.

"The day came to set up the basic outline and the invitation to people to create the Mandala. As we were finishing a small boy who was riding a bike




with his mother stopped outside the window and looked curiously inside obviously asking his mum what we were doing. Come inside and have a look, I encouraged and went to the door to greet them. He ran in to have a look and excitedly asked if he could add something. "We would be delighted for you to be the first person to start the design," I told him. With immense care he created the centre using a geometric design with beads and seeds of different sizes and colours. It was intricate and we professed amazement at his skill for his age (7 years).

Over the weeks we learned that the calisthenics girls spent time at the table. One in particular had almost reduced her teacher to tears with her attention to the detail of her work. Every Sunday was a delight to see the Mandala take shape with input from those within the worshipping congregation and those from the community. It was a joint effort to create something

beautiful and sacred.

When it was complete, we carried it to the church and gave a time in the service to bless it and those for whom it had been a blessing during its creation. We staged a brief conversation between three people about the origins of the Mandala as a universal sacred image of geometric beauty and design and its place in our Christian tradition. Our Mandala remains in church and our window offers something new and fresh. Come see.

Proposed itinerary for the Korean visit...


has been set for Sunday, September 6 at 3pm.

Presbytery in Council in focus...

A full Presbytery meeting happened on July 4th as the third of our five planned meetings for the year, writes Rev John Mann, Presbytery Secretary.

Our hosts were the Congregation at Noble Park (St. Columba's) again, as the proposed venue at Cornish College wasn't available. As many would know the Presbytery Office is at Noble Park and this has been a developing relationship. An education centre has been established in the St. Stephen's Room where most regular Presbytery Committee meetings are held. Code of Ethics sessions for ministers and many single events are regularly planned at this venue, which is quite centrally located in the Presbytery. A modern kitchen and sealed car park, funded by the congregation, are welcome additions to the complex. Main issues from the Presbytery meeting:


Sharing connects our community

Sisters weren't doing it for themselves

TWO of Port Phillip East Presbytery's favourite daughters reached a milestone last week.

Amelia 'Millie' Howden and Margaret Burrows joined others in celebrating 50 years since the Australian Inland Mission's (AIM) Andamooka Hospital opened - where these two dauntless ladies took up nursing posts.

Friday 28th August commemorated a golden anniversary in the South Australian opal mining town of Andamooka. For this was the date Andamooka Hospital was opened and it continues to this day under AIM's successor, Frontier Services.

Andamooka Hospital was one of many built by AIM as a means of bringing basic services to isolated Australians.

Its first superintendent was Rev Dr John 'of the Inland' Flynn, who brought 'Safety' to the people of the Inland. This took many forms; pastoral counselling, medical care, an outback radio network, pen pals and literature, as well as the world's first Flying Doctor service.

Members of High Street UC, Frankston, Margaret and Amelia, pictured at the hospital several decades ago were the first full-time staff at Andamooka. Together, they had travelled from Hobart to Adelaide where they stayed for three weeks preparing for the journey.

Shopping list

"Their shopping list included 'furniture, linen, crockery, medical equipment, hospital drugs and supplies, kitchen utensils, groceries, brooms, and a hundred other necessities to set up the hospital."


Once in Andamooka there were hectic days completing the fit-out before the doors opened for business.

The Sisters were much appreciated by the locals and trade was brisk, as they described: "Patients have been coming and going and there are so many exciting episodes of these early weeks that we cannot find words to relate them." they wrote in letters "brim full of adventures which one day will surely make another pioneering best-seller."

Road drama

Of particular note is this entry from 1965: "We had a very sick baby in and the Doctor wanted to have special drugs which we did not have. We knew Colonel Honeysett was to be here at 11am, so we told Doctor and he radioed the police in Woomera who chased after the Colonel's car with the drugs. So, there was great drama on the Woomera/ Andamooka road! The baby, which was almost dead on arrival, was revived and was later flown to Port Augusta where recovery was complete."

Reflections on Faith

For the King

Stories of wonderful Australians who make a real contribution to improve lives, health and well-being inspire... Fred Hollows is one.

An ophthalmologist, who spent his life restoring sight to thousands of people in developing countries and especially to indigenous Australians in remote communities. Four out of five people need not be blind. Inexpensive medication and

simple surgery can restore sight where there is cataract blindness. Fred was ably assisted in his work by his wife Gabi, who carries on his work today through

the Fred Hollows Foundation. At first Fred refused honours

and awards but later accepted some, believing the publicity would help their work. Each day in the outback they treated many patients with the same love, care and kindness from first to last. A recent ad publicising his work is remarkable. Fred is operating on a young indigenous boy and remarks, "You give each patient the same care as if you are operating on the King." Gifts of 25 dollars to the Foundation can restore the sight to one such boy. Reflection: Fred's life was serving and giving. His reward was each blind person receiving sight and his work continues. Paul in his letter to the Colossians 3 put it thus: "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as though you were working for the Lord and not for men. Remember that the Lord will give you as a reward what he has kept for his people. For Christ is the real Master you serve."



The Colloquium is an opportunity for the sharing of research, innovation and reflection around the connections between formation, discipleship and mission in relation to the Uniting Church. A frosty subject leaves listeners with a warm message

CHURCHES in Mornington, Mount Eliza and Mount Martha are working with local leaders and agencies to stage events on critical issues affecting our communities.

The group is called Peninsula Voice and it is a superb example of the church returning to the heart of community life. I attended this month's forum on the perils of the drug Ice, aka crystal meth (short for methamphetamine) which is damaging users and their families in our state and across the country. It's been in the national headlines as Senator Jacqui Lambie went public over her son's addiction to the drug.

The evening was most enlightening with Victorian Police Assistant Commissioner Stephen Fontana opening the presentations. He outlined how the use of illicit drugs is on the increase in Australia and the rural population is far from immune. The stats made for worrying listening.

The forum did put things in perspective, however. Revealing alcohol-related incidents (a legal substance) are much higher than drug-related.

Other speakers talked about the need to make our



communities 'rat parks' (this stems from research that showed that rats chose not to drink from water bottles containing drugs when they lived in an environment

with interesting and engaging lifestyle choices; opting for the fresh water bottles instead.)

My most pleasing take-home from the event, to which I took my teenage sons as a pre-emptive strike, was that one of the other speakers, Julie Rae from the Australian Drug Foundation, cited

protective factors that usually prevent children from turning to drugs. They are:

- 1. Positive relationship with parents, providing structure and boundaries.
- 2. A positive school environment.
- 3. Having spiritual beliefs.

She referenced 'going to church' in point three. Encouraging to hear spiritual nourishment is central to family and societal harmony. Worth promoting.




Lentara UnitingCare is calling for support for a crowd funding campaign recently launched by their Asylum Seeker Project.

The Asylum Seeker Project is one of the biggest asylum seeker housing programs in Victoria and currently houses 56 people across metropolitan Melbourne. Demand for housing from asylum seekers is high and supplying cost-free housing is not cheap the costs of rent, utilities, repairs, appliances and basic living expenses such as groceries and household items add up. This is why they desperately need help to continue to support vulnerable people in the community, and provide accommodation to those seeking asylum. 
