Security is increasingly in the spotlight at our

churches

A RECENT spate of burglaries, thefts and criminal damage incidents at PPEP churches has peaked with a break- in at the Cranbourne Food Truck.

This wonderful service to feed homeless people and those in need has suffered at the hands of what appear to be 'adolescent thieves.'

A run of incidents at churches in recent weeks stimulates a call to all ministers and their teams to step up their security to stem

the tide of criminal intent on vulnerable church spaces. The first incident was when thieves are believed to have hidden out in side rooms in the evening at Noble Park UCA recently, leading to key thefts and IT equipment stolen from neighbouring offices.

Then a coin donation barrel in aid of the LARDER appeal was also taken from a foyer at a Mornington Peninsula church and was found later in a neighbouring Anglican church yard: a site that has also suffered breaks-in in recent weeks.

This series of incidents was eclipsed by the food truck damage and thefts just before Christmas.

Rev Wendy Snook, of Cranbourne UC, says: "At about midnight Sunday before Christmas two young males were seen on monkey bikes behind the house next to the church. We think they did some graffiti on our newly painted shipping container (which has since been repainted.)

"Then about 4am, the neighbours' dogs barked. More than one person, possibly the same ones, returned with bolt cutters, screw driver and scanners. Initially they tried to break our security lighting bulbs, and got some. Then they climbed on the roof of the church hall and food truck garage, and turned a security light upwards. Then they found the lighting wiring on the



roof and and ripped it out.

"They used bolt cutters to cut the garage gate, then the six padlocks and hasps

on the truck itself were cut or levered open and the truck door lock was broken.

She adds: "They got into all the side truck bays. The only one not broken was at the centre back facing the street, where the generator and tables were kept. It

was the most visible; even without the security lights on. Then from the loaded truck they took food, of the easy to eat variety. Teenage boy type food. All the two-minute noodles, muesli bars, tunas, biscuits, pop tarts, peanut butters, vegemite! and spaghetti tins, etc. they didn't take 'healthy' foods!

"They were obviously disturbed as a little of the food was left outside the truck nearby. They did not get into the shipping container, praise the Lord, as we had food for Christmas ready.

"They also stole a special light which had been bolted and wired inside the truck. They needed tools to remove it. But they left the microwave, pie warmer etc. alone. So it is difficult to guess motivation. Perhaps 'midnight munchies? Or on a grander scale? Trainee criminals? People who don't care about the needy, and want immediate gratification? I don't know.

"The police said in future, we need to put an alarm on the truck, and a security camera system if we can afford it. We had done everything else possible. So that is the story. Meanwhile the truck had to be reloaded and sent out as usual on Monday night, and the following days, including Christmas Day! And our Food Truck Support Worker Chris finished her job yesterday, and we were training the new Worker Debbie Wallace from Hampton Park UCA at the same time. It has been a busy time!"


CHURCHES from across the Presbytery have shown enthusiasm and energy in their support for Act for Peace's annual Christmas Bowl Appeal.

A call for prayer

I admit dismay when I first saw the front cover image of the New York Daily News last month, writes Moderator Dan Wootton.

It proclaimed "God Isn't Fixing This" and was in direct response to social media postings by American government representatives following the shootings in San Bernardino. According to the newspaper, those tweeting to pray for the victims were the very people with the power to change the gun laws. The suggestion was that the call to prayer was repetitive and meaningless.

The essence of the call to prayer certainly involves repetition, yet

it is far from meaningless. Prayer can unify, particularly in moments of turbulence. Nowhere was this better demonstrated than in the aftermath of the Paris terrorism attack when the social media hashtag #prayforparis resonated globally. The challenge for us all is to remember that many for whom we pray continue to suffer long after they leave the front page headlines we hungrily consume. Prayer can be an effective spiritual 'weapon' against violence and injustice, but first it should take deliberate aim not a vague aspiration for peace and security.

A starting point is that violence and injustice in the world is not outside us but inside us. Each one of us forms the world. For those who feel the urge to offer prayer in a public manner, I would recommend careful analysis of motives. The violence plaquing our world is the result of our failure to see the other person or group of people as fully human as ourselves.It's a matter of not being afraid to look into the depths of suffering. Love always involves risk. At Christmas there is much focus on the historic birth of Christ. But the real focus should be on the birth of love – and suffering is the ground on which love is born. If we haven't suffered, that is if we haven't seen the suffering of other people, we won't begin to understand what it means to love.
