Sarah's spirit





IT was a beautiful day - the sun shone, not a breath of wind and a lovely mild morning.

In fact, Sunday February 7th could not have been

more perfect for a group from The Village Church, along with

family and friends, to gather on Canadian Bay Beach in Mt

Eliza.
Prayers were
spoken, a new creed
recited, questions
asked and responses

made: "What do you ask of God's Church?" "I ask to be baptised into the faith and family of Jesus Christ." A moving testimony shared, and Sarah Louise Last was baptised by full immersion in the bay.

Sarah, aged 22, came to The Village Church about 18 months ago. A veterinary science student, Sarah had discovered, unlike her two older siblings, she hadn't been baptised as a child. She wanted to explore what Christian faith was about, she was keen to be baptised and over the following 18 months Sarah became part of the church community. She explored and asked

... but fire rages at Noble Park

FIREBUGS have struck at Noble Park Uniting Church in a string of criminal damage incidents that have left police and churchgoers baffled.

In the early hours of Wednesday, February 17 a fire was lit in the kitchen adjacent to the church hall, explains Presbytery Minister Rev John Mann. "The kitchen has been totally destroyed and the adjoining hall so badly damaged that it will not be able to be used until extensive repairs are made. An early estimate of the damage is \$1m plus" While the fire was contained to the hall and kitchen, the church foyer suffered smoke damage, but fortunately, apart from smelling of smoke,



New life and hope in war-ravaged Sri Lanka

In the North of war-ravaged Sri Lanka, in Murunkan, the Methodist church has a farm of 60 acres called 'Jeevodhayam' (which means "as long as there is life there is hope").

It was started by Rev. Jeyarajasingham in 1974, 40 years ago, and developed very well until he had an untimely death at the hands of the military.

Raja Rajakulendran, a minister from the Church of South India, settled in Australia started the Tamil church in Melbourne and worked in several churches in Victoria.

He had the courage and extraordinary vision to go back to the totally neglected Jeevodhayam farm in 2013 as a missionary to live and work. About 40 acres of the farm

were cleared to plant cashew. Raja was supported by UnitingWorld and the VicTas Synod of the Uniting Church. Perhaps few thought he would succeed!

His passion and hard work together with his training in farming and agriculture have contributed to a farm now that has 1,600 cashew plants with capacity for more. Each plant is expected to yield ten kilos of cashew from 2020. Unprocessed this gives Rs.3000 per plant (about \$30). This means a much needed and guaranteed income for the community and the Methodist church of Rs 4,800,000 (\$48,000) every year from 2020. This is a big sum of money.





It is a joint local community venture because locals, especially women are increasingly employed in cultivating, cleaning and selling cashew. This is the first time Jeevodhayam is moving to self-sustaining cashew cultivation. The farm is accepted as a key supplier by the Government owned Cashew Corporation of Sri Lanka. The ministry at this place has a preschool of 18 children; a Friday club for 35 pre-schoolers; an English learning group of 55 meeting every Saturday; an annual youth camp for 70 youths, Sunday worship and pastoral care. In 2015 the farm hosted a field education programme for six theological students of different denominations from the Theological College of Lanka at Pilimatalawa. There is potential to develop the place for visitors on a pilgrimage or for tourism. In Murunkan, Raja has worked with

leaders and ordinary people from all religions including the strong leader, Roman Catholic Bishop Rayappu Joseph.

2016 is a celebration of 40 years in ministry for Raja and his wife Kala. This will be celebrated on:

April 2nd at the Koornang Uniting Church at 10.30am. Rev. Asiri Perera, President of the Methodist Church in Sri Lanka who has supported this project enthusiastically will grace the occasion. together.

Hampton's major make-over draws to an end

2016 sees Hampton UCA settling into its totally renovated facilities, including two new manses, with still over \$300,000 to make available for the wider church. Here's the story of how they did it...

"Over five years ago the Hampton Church Council realised that our existing manse needed extensive and expensive renovation, or a complete knock-down and rebuild, requiring funding that the congregation just didn't have," explains Council Chair, Ian Menzies.

"Simultaneously, new insurance requirements meant that

the little-used tennis court on the church's site could no longer be maintained. Being 'land-locked' it was not really saleable, so we made the decision to instead to sell



the run-down manse and rebuild on the tennis court site." That site was too valuable to for just one home, so the major decision was then taken to take the more complicated but ultimately more rewarding route and build two. Several years of seeking various approvals followed, and when all were in

place the old manse was auctioned and sold for a pleasing \$1.3 million.

With careful selection and much design tweaking, two 'project homes' were built. Synod manse requirements were kept in mind, and both are now in use as manses. Careful oversight ensured that the project came in around \$100,000 under the approved budget, despite the many issues and unexpected matters that arose along the way.

"Once the remaining funding was more certain, other projects could be taken up," Ian continues.

An impressive figure of around \$300,000 now remains from the Property Sales Proceeds to be shared with wider church. Hampton's former



property liabilities of a dilapidated manse and a disused tennis court have been transformed into the valuable assets of two brand new homes and a completely renovated suite of church buildings. "What's not to like?" says a relieved and pleased lan as the various projects draw to a close.

`Life's lessons' by Rev Ross Stanford

A COUPLE of years ago I took the funeral of the son of one of our members, who had been intellectually handicapped from birth.

Reflections on Faith

His sister gave a most moving eulogy, including some reflection on the effect that this man had on the lives of his family. I spoke with her afterwards and she gave me permission to use it. Her words speak volumes about what is truly important in life and capture the essence of the Christian ethic. "... I have always felt very protective of my little brother and watched and cared over him all of my life as have my brother and sisters. (My family) would probably agree that our worry for Pete was teaching him life skills and enduring the hardships of life, and keeping him safe. Our roles as teacher and his as student was a life time

lesson. But, as I sat with him in his last few days and talked about the life he's had and the experiences we've

shared, I came to the realization that somewhere along the line our roles had been reversed. He was the teacher and we were the students. Very early on in a small country town - back in the 1950's and 60's - the attitude to the disabled was very different, especially amongst children. During that time I learnt about discrimination, about standing up for the underdog. I learnt through Pete not to judge people by the way they looked or the colour of their skin but what was in their heart. He taught us patience and empathy. He taught us to love the simple things in life, to accept things that we cannot change



Our friends in Fiji are suffering widespread destruction in the aftermath of Cyclone Winston, which hit on Saturday 20th February.

Reports to date indicate that 29 people are confirmed dead and around 14,000 people are sheltering in evacuation centers. Whole villages have been destroyed, particularly on the island of Koro where a relief and assessment ship is being deployed.

Share has launced an emergency appeal with donations supporting UnitingWorld's partner, the Methodist Church in Fiji. The Methodist Church is the largest denomination in the country, covering an extensive network across 55 districts. President Rev Tevita Bainivanua has opened all church buildings for emergency shelter and has directed ministers throughout the country to assess and report on the extent of the damage.

According to UnitingWorld staff member Rev Dr Cliff Bird, who is on the ground in the capital of Suva, destruction has been "widespread and very bad."

"The Lau group of islands, Koro Island, villages on Vanua Levu and their township Savusavu have been hit very badly. Hundreds of homes have been lost, infrastructure damaged, farms, vegetable gardens, livelihoods destroyed. Water and power supply to many areas are still down," he said.

Donations will be forwarded to UnitingWorld and used to support the Methodist Church's relief efforts, including:

- re-establishing healthcare and schools
- replanting crops and livelihoods and
- 'building back better' to safeguard communities against future cyclones.



It is hoped that many Ministers and those in leadership in the Church in the Synod will take the opportunity to come and explore and learn how we could minister effectively and meaningfully in a multi-cultural Church that is seeking to be intercultural.

College growth and expansion is testament to Kerry's years of service

A LASTING tribute to Kerry Bolger has been opened by the man himself.

The new Kerry Bolger Centre at Cornish College was officially opened by former Principal, Mr Kerry Bolger, on Friday 26 February, 2016.

The new building houses six classrooms for Years 4, 5 and 6 students, along with breakout spaces. Mr Bolger was the Founding Principal of Cornish College when it opened in 2012, until he retired at the end of 2015. Prior to this, Mr Bolger was Head of Cornish Campus, St Leonard's College, for over 20 years. Mr Bolger cut the ribbon with assistance from some of the Primary Student Leaders.



He says: "I was delighted to open the new building as it is testimony to what a community can achieve when




it pools its resources and works with persistence. I hope the students enjoy the wonderful learning environment and it will inspire them to be the best they can be". At the opening, The Kerry Bolger Centre was dedicated by Rev Dr Robert Johnson, Chairperson, Cornish College Council. The Year 4 EcoKids grew cuttings of Pigface, an indigenous groundcover, for all of the guests to take home. It is drought tolerant and suitable for sandy soils.

The building is part of a broader building improvement program the school is undertaking as a result of significant growth in student numbers. There are 615 ELC to Year 12 students at Cornish

College this year, up from 543 students in 2015. The College opened in 2012 with 220 students. Cornish College's motto is Make a Difference and at its core is the development of independence, compassion and personal excellence in order for students to make a positive contribution for a sustainable future. Future developments at the College will include a Senior Learning Centre for Years 10 to 12, a new Middle School Wing for Years 7 to 9 and the re-development of the Arts, Drama and Music facilities.


