Breaking new ground in Living Leadership

A HEALTHY crowd turned out on the Peninsula recently to hear and share ideas on Living Leadership.

Jenny Byrne, Executive Director of the Centre for Theology & Ministry for the UCA VicTas, braved a cold midweek night to head down to St Mark's, Mornington to enlarge on this energising development program, *writes Helen Beeby.*

After a shared supper of hearty home-made soups, crusty bread and dinner-table conversations the question was asked: "What makes us distinct in the Uniting Church?"

Jenny elaborated by taking us through an interactive session that explored our submerged beliefs and values underpinning the outward symbols and behaviours that inhabit our churches and sacred spaces. She referenced the Basis of Union; that we are 'People of God on the way' - a movement not an institution - and

explained the concept of a sigmoid curve. This is an 'S' shaped line where the curve initially declines in a time of experimenting and learning, then rises in a straight line of growth and prosperity, and finally curves in decline, leading to the end. Unless you do something vital in the final phase to create a new upward curve it spells an end to the organisation. This can be a time that leads to conflict between the old and the new.





Jenny says: "During the latter half of the 20th century the UCA was on the straight upward line of the sigmoid curve - all we had to do was steady the ship. Now we are at the point where we need a new upward curve."

She added: "Only 3% of space travel is

on the correct flight path; all the rest is just correction.

"Sometimes we are fearful of taking a step because we are unsure if it is the right step. What we need to remember is the whole carpet is God, not just where we step." All this, and more, can be explored on the

Living Leadership page of the CTM website at http://ctm.uca.edu.au/living-leadership/Rev John Haig, of St Mark's, Mornington concludes: "It was good to have the CTM come to us and it was great for the church leaders to get together - we plan do it more often."

Church Council Secretary, Sue Davies coordinated the evening and St Mark's will be prepared to host a similar occasion next year.




BUILDING bridges in the South Sudanese community in the Officer Pakenham Mission Area will now be much easier.


CONGRATULATIONS to Dandenong North Uniting Church which celebrated its 60th years anniversary for serving the community on the last day of July.

Cuts run deep





by Federal Government funding cuts which threaten vulnerable and sick older people, Uniting AgeWell Interim Executive Director Peter Folliot said today.

Peter said aged care providers would struggle to meet the health care needs of vulnerable and

sick older people.

"These cuts to the Aged Care Funding Instrument which the Federal Government is proposing would reduce funding by up to \$18,000 for older people with the most complex health needs," Peter said.

Under the proposed cuts, critical health needs such as wound and skin care, mobility needs, arthritis treatment and end of life care will be under direct threat.

Peter adds: "Uniting AgeWell is one of Victoria's largest not-for-profit aged care providers and we are proud of our great staff who work hard to care for vulnerable and sick older people in Victoria.

"As an aged care provider in Victoria, we call on MPs to vote against these cuts."

Dear Uniting Church friends,

I am writing to inform you of a decision taken by the Synod Standing Committee (SSC) in December 2015, on advice from the Finance Committee, BOMAR and the Property Board, which is starting to impact on the life of the Church. As you may be aware, as a whole of Church we have been living beyond our financial means – essentially our expenses exceed our income and we have an operating deficit. That was one reason the 2013 Synod meeting decided to establish a Major Strategic Review, which was tasked with forming a vision and plan for the future of the Church and undertaking a holistic financial sustainability review to support that vision and plan. However, the MSR was futurefocused, and it was clear from the advice of the key Synod reporting bodies, that the financial difficulties had become immediate and urgent. The Finance Committee informed the SSC in December last year that levels of proposed expenditure by the Synod were unsustainable...For the full letter click on: http://www.ucappep.org/newsbeat/notices/
