# Queen's Representative is given a royal welcome at Clayton

COOK Islanders were thrilled to be able to meet and mingle with their very own Queen's Representative recently - and they gathered at Port Phillip East Presbytery's Cook Islands Uniting Church.

The Cook Islands community of Melbourne turned out in force at the Clayton church on Tuesday, September 20 to welcome these special guests - the equivalent of our Governor General, writes Faye Sanderson.

The Cook Islands Queen's Representative, Tom Marsters, and his wife, Tuaine, pictured right, were making the first visit to Australia by a

They received a traditional
welcome with a warri (one
man version of a New
Zealand Haka) and, naturally,
a lovely kai kai of islands
food. The QR had come to
Sydney as part of a fundraising

effort to build a hostel on the main island of Rarotonga for the people of the outer island of Palmerston to call home when they visit the main island. This is the last outer island to build a hostel.

Mr Marsters also visited Cook Islands communities in Brisbane, Townsville and Cairns before his last stop in Melbourne. There are about 10,000 people in the Cook Islands, another 30,000 in Australia and about 50,000 in NZ – where he has made an official visit in the past. Over the two days in Melbourne \$15,500 was donated including moneys generated at a fundraising concert. There was also a Q&A session at the Clayton church where all things, except political, were open for discussion.

Although being the QR, the couple are very approachable and mixed with the people. Not a security detail in sight although, when he arrived at Tullamarine, he was hustled out the VIP entrance; against his pleas to be with his people. Others attending the welcome, hosted by Chair of the Cook Islands Community, were Ms Nga Hosking, local councillor with City of Monash and media from SBS. Apparently word did get to our Governor General, Sir Peter Cosgrove, that the QR was in the country but he was unavailable to meet with him. The SBS website report, however, said 'the QR rocks Clayton!'

### Refugee rescue at Mornington

St Mark's, Mornington has been able to respond to an urgent request for a wheelchair from Dandenong's Refugee and Asylum Seeker Centre this week.

The wheelchair was for Mahmood, who accompanied David Spittler on a visit to St Mark's for Refugee Sunday, featured in last month's Newsbeat.

Mahmood had a recurrence of a back injury he sustained during a car trip from Adelaide, and as he is within three months of completing his course at



Chisholm, and on limited financial support, he was looking for a wheelchair for around three months. On Tuesday St Mark's was able to supply a surplus wheelchair for Mahmood.


on the following Saturday, they arrived at the lake with all their gear – rods, bait, buckets, sinkers all the things you need to fish were put into

learn and spread the knowledge of Christ within the local community and further afield.




A few months ago, I had the privilege of baptising a dear little Nauruan baby. I named him Benedict. He was born a diabetic and breathed heavily through a tube. He was dearly loved by his family, especially his little brothers. At the age of 10 months, Benedict died. It was my privilege to take his funeral service at a Frankston Chapel. Sadness was real, but we were uplifted by wonderful singing of hymns in the Nauruan language including "Jesus loves me". A moving eulogy was given in poetic form by one of his nurses. We journeyed to the Bunurong

Memorial Park for the burial. His tiny coffin was decorated with St Kilda football colours, the family team. His brothers carried it to the grave, where it was gently lowered. This special part of the cemetery was called The Avenue of Rainbows. The graves of many babies and little children surrounded us. It rained all throughout the service. But as we were leaving the clouds on the horizon opened, and a rainbow spread across the sky. We left assured that little Benedict had been born to a new life, and he was with the saints.

The children in the church all had to write something


