




Fire and road-widening couldn't hold back worship at High Street Road

MORE than 200 people, celebrated the 130th Anniversary Service of High Street Road Uniting Church recently, and the festivities included the release of a new book entitled *High Street Road Uniting Church, A Collection of Documents and Images, 1887 to 2017,* by Cliff Harding. This fascinating tale began in 1887 when the first Methodist service was held in the wattle and daub home of newlyweds Mr and Mrs Albert Lechte who donated the land on which a weatherboard church was built the following year.

In July 1892 the cutting on High Street Road was widened and the church was left on the side of the cutting with only pedestrian access. Eight years later the building was moved by four men and 14 horses to its present site.

Disaster struck when the church was totally destroyed by fire in February 1945, resulting in services being held in "Horti" Hall on the opposite side of Stewart Street. (Even though it was opposite Mount Waverley Fire Station, "Horti" Hall was also destroyed by fire in 1981). A new Sunday School, a Church and Christian Education buildings

were progressively built between 1947 and 1964. Three years before the inauguration of the Uniting Church, the congregations of High Street Road Methodist Church and Syndal Presbyterian Church agreed to commence their "Oneness" process. This quickly progressed and the first service of the Joint Parish was held on 3rd February 1974. The ministers who helped guide the journey to Oneness were Rev Bruce Prewer, followed by Rev Bill Trewin and Rev Fred Strickland. Rev Bill Trewin facilitated the establishment of many fellowship groups during his ministry. The congregation celebrated the Church

Centenary in 1987 with a number of events including special services, a Ladies Fellowship Lunch, the launch of Margaret Turnbull's book "One in Christ" and also the launch of the "Centenary Cook Book". A special Centenary Tree banner was also made where each family embroidered their names onto a leaf. It's still on the wall and was admired at the 130th event on June 12th.

beautiful artworks that have added visual links to Sunday services.


The Christmas poinsettias are a special feature while butterflies adorn other examples of her beautiful work.

TWO well-known faces have landed vital new roles to link the work of our community service agencies with the missional life of congregations.

Rev (Deacon) Gavin Blakemore, Director of Mission with Uniting Wesley, has taken on board the role of Mission and Ethos

expanded role within Uniting. Lisa previously served at Wesley Geelong City

Church and is focussed on helping congregations look outward to engage with their community and the needs around them. She has a proven ability to speak the

community's language and form lasting, creative partnerships. Uniting is the community services arm of the Uniting Church in Victoria and Tasmania and has been supporting Australians for more than

100 years. All Victorian and Tasmanian UnitingCare agencies, Wesley Mission, Share and Early Childhood Services merged under one governance on July 1. John adds: "Uniting and the Synod Standing Committee have made a very conscious commitment to honour our foundational values to serve humanity by creating an inclusive, connected and just world. In line with this commitment, we will build and strengthen

our relationships with congregations and local communities, which is at the heart of everything we do. As we develop our mutual engagement over the next six months, we will be consulting widely across the church to understand and plan an appropriate model of mutual support and partnership."

Joining the JIM Unit in global campaigns

BENTLEIGH Uniting Church hosted the Heather Circle's fundraising afternoon tea on Tuesday 11th July to hear Dr Mark Zirnsak, Director of Synod's Justice and International Mission Unit give an overview of their work.

Addressing more than 40 people, including UCAF members and friends from other churches and organisations, Mark outlined the JIM Unit's contribution to the following:

- Disrupting access to child sexual abuse material.
- Illegal Logging Prohibition Act.
- · Licensing of labour hire businesses in Victoria.
- Measures to curb tax avoidance and evasion.
- Removal of ATM's from pokie venues in Victoria.
- A system that allows pokie gamblers to track their losses.
- Significant reduction in human trafficking in the Thai seafood industry.

He added that security forces murdering church members in the Philippines has largely ended.

Mark also spoke about some of the barriers to love of neighbour, including:

- The rise of racism and nationalism.
- Unethical marketing consumer leases, alcohol and gambling industries
- Lack of services housing, mental health, family violence, aged care.
- Labour rights abuses in the production of goods.
- Exploiting the vulnerable.
- · Paying bribes.
- Tax dodging and not enough government revenue.





Spotlight on BOMAR applications

A SPECIAL Presbytery in Council meeting was held at Noble Park on the evening of July 12.

The only business of the meeting was to deal with five applications for funding from BOMAR (Board of Mission and Resourcing).

The five applicants were Berwick, Cranbourne, Hampton Park, Mount Eliza and Southern Mornington Peninsula.Berwick was applying for a grant for a Family and Childrens' Worker to help with playgroups, Messy Church and to help resource the Kids Church Sunday Program.

Cranbourne was seeking funds to help pay for a full-time minister. The main mission at Cranbourne is the food truck which operates four nights per week and provides free food and fellowship to the homeless, poor and disadvantaged in Cranbourne.

Hampton Park is a congregation that is well known for its creative and effective ministry in a difficult lower socio-economic community. Funds were being sought to continue this ministry.

At Mount Eliza a grant was requested to fund a Music Pastor with the objective of moving music into new genres and encouraging more participation by church members.

Donation at the door (we

suggest \$15 +) helps meet

the costs of the musicians involved.

Afternoon tea to follow.

The Southern Mornington Peninsula Congregation has had a long term vision of providing accommodation for people with an acquired brain injury. Funds were being sought to employ a Carer Support Worker who would support carers in the often difficult and frustrating task of dealing with the demands of government departments. Each Congregation was given time to talk to their applications and the opportunity was given for Presbytery members to ask
