Speed-Date-a-Moslem is a winner in the

eastern suburbs

IT may sound like an unusual concept, but the Speed-Date-a-Moslem events by Hana Assafari, pictured standing on the right of the photo, has become something of a phenomenon.

So 'The Side Door' Social Justice Hub was delighted to bring the concept to the eastern suburbs on Sunday, August 20th. St John's, Elsternwick, has hosted a couple of speaker events focussed on Israel-Palestine relationships this year, through the Jewish member of the Steering Committee, so Hana Assafiri's initiative (that began at her Moroccan Soup Bar in North Fitzroy) seemed like a fabulous follow up.



Rev Philip Liebelt says: "The event enables people to sit with a Moslem woman and ask respectful questions during a single hour (that went all too quickly). The gathering of nearly 40 people that gathered at St Johns consisted of about a third Moslem, a third Christian and a third Jewish, some having travelled a long distance to be there.

"Hopefully another small step has been taken for increased understanding, awareness, tolerance and, therefore, peace in the world," Rev Liebelt adds.









Dog days...


HEATHERTON-Dingley UCA is holding another Bark and Chat

Whoopee! We're 40! But wait...

IN June, the UCA turned 40.

On people's milestone birthdays they look back as well as forward. There is a lot of the latter happening - our membership diminishing and ageing; old methods of governance becoming unsustainable and suites of buildings under-utilised and unmaintainable. There has been much commentary to help us think about our future in a Church we know and love.

I believe rumours of a pending demise of the UCA are exaggerated. Yes, there are fewer congregations - and many are

smaller and older. But look at ministry to youth and young adults in some places; at the influx and size of ethnic congregations; at the high regard we are held in for our social justice and social welfare. There can be renewed hope. Professor Andrew Dutney, past

President and 'Basis of Union' scholar reflects: "The point of church union was renewal ... in faith and mission. Only Christ ... renews the church (paragraph 4). But we can make ourselves open to that renewal. 'The Basis' calls us to do just that – and shows us how."*

It was a document ahead of its

time, using language still relevant today. Our Church has been renewing itself for 40 years. Think, for

example, about the declaration of multi-culturalism; our relationship with the First Peoples; how we handled the challenge that saw NCYC replaced by an event that was more manageable; the emergence of Lay Ministry teams to serve (mainly) rural congregations; the embracing of Fresh Expressions and regeneration of the Church. We are a Church of renewal - always

> have been. It continues to renew or re-invent itself. Dutney writes: "The Basis of Union was not trying to set up

a new denomination... The Uniting Church was meant to be an interim way of being church, on the way to the end of denominationalism. It is not (us)... that (are) called to be a 'pilgrim people' (but)... Christians... always moving forward to the promise of the fulfilment

of God's kingdom."**

Take this challenge as a possibility. In recent years Australia's birth rate has hit a 30-year high. Young families and children offer a huge mission field if we are alive to the potential. But there are parents and grandparents who have never been involved with church.

What we, who have stayed there, are happy to attend on Sundays, has no attraction or relevance to them. The challenge is to reinvent ourselves using new ways

of being church, like 'Messy Church' – a 'Fresh Expression' that is attracting such families.

The content is not new, but the packaging is. Young people are asking the same big questions we are; they just don't expect the Church to have the answers. Find the right language, the right vehicle, and build relationships and we can be relevant to

New Life UCA on the Gold Coast is a mega church doing two things large churches have no monopoly on. Firstly, attracting the 'unchurched' (no experience of church), the 'de-churched' (who drifted from the church long ago) and the 'over-churched' (who the Christian church has hurt or abused).

Secondly, they are starting ministries initiated by lay people (not ordained leaders) who have a passion to see a particular group reached or helped. They have ministries with the disabled; victims of domestic violence; those on society's margins and sex workers. What might it be for your church?

We need to be careful not to just play the numbers game, and do what will sustain us moving forward. Rather it is about being faithful to our calling to serve our community and share Kingdom values with it. Do that effectively and future sustainability will take care of itself.



Mongolian missionary maestro shares music at Council

THE evening of the Presbytery meeting was cold and wet, which hopefully explains why the numbers were well down, writes Ian Firth.

Despite that the meeting got off to a bright start Mr Seung-Young Chung talking to the Presbytery about his experience as a Uniting World missionary in Mongolia teaching music. Mr Chung is an accomplished musician having been a member of the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra and the KBS Symphony Orchestra, Concert Master of the Dae-Jun Philharmonic Orchestra (in Korea) and the Whitehorse Orchestra. While In Mongolia he was the conductor of the Mongolian National Philharmonic Orchestra. Mr Chung's wife, Younn-Sin Chung went with him to Mongolia.

Mr Chung interspersed his talk by playing both classical and religious music on violin, viola and the Mongolian fiddle. The fiddle needs to be held between the knees and the sound is created by drawing the bow over the two strings. Mr Chung said that as a music teacher he had a freedom to speak about the gospel and about Jesus that would have otherwise been denied to him. During the supper break I asked him how he communicated given he spoke little Mongolian and that English is not widely spoken in Mongolia. The answer was Korean! So with a mixture of Mongolian, English and Korean Mr Chung managed to tell the gospel story. How much easier it is for us. We also had a presentation from Bronwyn Molloy from the Victorian Council of Churches. Bronwyn informed the Presbytery of the Emergency Ministry offered by the VCC in times of crisis. She talked about the training required and the fact that, to be involved in this work, a



person must be a member of a faith community. The Presbytery appointed the Revs Andrew Boyle, Jay Robinson and Pastor Hannah Dungan to the 15th Triennial Assembly to be held at Box Hill in July, 2018. Presbytery also adopted a change in policy concerning the distribution of the property sale proceeds following either the sale of redundant congregational property or major property development in Presbytery. Any funds remaining after approved mission and ministry projects of the congregation are now to be gifted to the Presbytery's Interest Only Mission Fund to be used for mission and ministry in the Presbytery. The meeting resolved to close Dandenong North from October 1 following a request from the Congregation.
