Christ in the community



FOR more than 15 years Mount Waverley Chadstone InterChurch Council has held a community service campaign with IGA in the local shopping centre, *writes Ros Faichney*. This year, 114 boxes and more than \$1,400 was collected!

Each day between 9am and 5pm, stalwart volunteers from member

churches of the MWCICC staff shopping trollies outside IGA. Here they hand leaflets to shoppers explaining the purpose of the campaign – to collect non-perishable food items - and invite shoppers to contribute to the collection of food or to donate money.

This food and cash is then made available to the charities nominated by the participating churches to provide assistance to the needy in our community. Charities include Uniting Lentara, Anglicare, St Vinnies, Asylum Seeker Centres.There are four Uniting Churches



active in this programme. St John's UC is the main collection and distribution centre for the items.

Cultivating a new future

PORT Phillip East Presbytery is taking a bold and innovative step to meet the challenges faced by our church in the years to come.

Chair of the Presbytery, Rev Andrew Boyle, explains: "We have engaged the Rev. Phil McCredden of *Ecclesia Leadership*, to facilitate a cultural change process in our Presbytery.

"While the Presbytery is facing challenges over the next 12 months, as we implement the recommendations of the Synod's Major Strategic Review, we would be unwise to ignore the cultural changes which have overtaken the church and our need to adapt to

these changes while responding to new developments.

"The church as we have known it is rapidly disappearing and the Presbytery is struggling to fulfil its essential role of oversight of the ministers and congregations within its bounds. "We have tried to undertake such a process ourselves but this has proven impossible given the demands on Presbytery

leadership, congregations and ministers. We are struggling

to cope with responding to the many and varied demands which face us. This is also a process which will require significant skill and experience and sustained attention to guide this process of change. Hence we have engaged Phil McCredden, an experienced external consultant, to work with us."

The title of this project is **Cultivating a New Future** and its purpose will be twofold. To create and implement a strategy to:

- Develop a cultural change process for the Presbytery that responds to the challenges presented by the post-Christendom mission context.
- Respond to changes brought about by the Synod's major strategic review (MSR)

There will be five objectives:

- 1. Assess the health of congregations.
- 2. Review the effectiveness of ministers and local leaders.
- 3. Develop ways for the Presbytery to support local churches in response to the first two objectives.
- 4. Identify ways in which both clergy and lay people may be more engaged in the Presbytery.

5. Review the financial, personnel and property resources available to the Presbytery.

The project will run for 15-18 months and will involve four stages:

- Discovering
- Reflecting
- Planning
- Implementing

During this time we will be engaging with congregations, their leadership and ministers to ensure that the process

will benefit all congregations within the Presbytery's bounds and strengthen the Presbytery's role. We trust that you will find the opportunities for input, reflection and engagement stimulating and life-giving.

From Sudan to Springvale - perseverance through 'the redeeming power of Christ'

PAUL Aleu Dau was inducted at Springvale Uniting last month - after an incredible journey from war-torn South Sudan into Ethiopia before reaching the shores of Australia 14 years ago.

Paul completed his ministry training in 2014 and has had to wait quite a while for a placement, *writes Ian Firth*.

So it was a joyous occasion when he was inducted as minister of the Springvale Congregation on the afternoon of Sunday, November 5. Rev James Douglas was guest preacher on the day and Rev Andrew Boyle, Presbytery Chair, presided.

In his remarks, following the induction, Paul acknowledged the 11 places where he has exercised ministry, as either field placements or supply ministries.

He started his journey to Australia in 1987 when he fled embattled Sudan for the safety of Ethiopia. He arrived in Melbourne in May 2003 and, in 2004, commenced a Period of Discernment, the first step on the road to ordained ministry. The Springvale Congregation has a proud record of working



with the South Sudanese community. It helped train the first South Sudanese minister in the Synod. Now, with Paul's induction, the Congregation has called the second to be its minister.

Paul is married to Ajah Atem Riak and they have six children, daughters Susan and Sarah and four boys, John Emmanuel,



Isaiah and David.In a speech about Paul's journey, these words were expressed: "Paul's faith in God has been shaped by a constant struggle to make sense of life's meaning: what it all means, what to hope for when overwhelming feelings of personal loss and dispossession occasioned by war were all too real to ignore, and in situations where

hope has been diminished and the very foundation of life has been seriously shaken, seeking answers in theological thoughts appeared like an ideal path. Paul's faith has been strengthen by the hope and the freedom revealed in Jesus Christ. Isaiah said, those who were in the darkness have seen a great light (Isa. 9:2). The great light this text refers to is the redeeming power of Christ. He never lost faith despite all the hardships he endured. It is this story of hope grounded and revealed to us in the Gospel that he wishes to share with the people of God at the Springvale Uniting Church and beyond."

IN Sharing the Darkness, Sheila Cassidy, one time Nun, then Medical Director of St Luke's Hospice in Plymouth, wrote movingly of an experience on Christmas Day in the Hospice.

David, who suffered from a malignant cancer in his mouth, had tried desperately to maintain his independence, as an out-patient. On Christmas Day he was forced to come in for treatment. A single man, he was accompanied by a community nurse. David handed Dr Cassidy a bottle of champagne with a scribbled note attached, "I appreciate all you are doing for me." Sheila wondered about Christmas dinner and asked whether he could manage a little liquid turkey. She was almost reduced to tears when he replied. "Thank you, but a little watery porridge will be fine." On Christmas Eve, in our city there will be homeless, sleeping under a bridge, outside a church or railway station. Anywhere there is shelter. In the morning they will awaken, pack up their meagre possessions and walk the streets, hungry, hoping to be invited to have a meal, prepared by mission, church, street kitchen, or charity. There will be people on board ships, or on tour, who cannot face being home at Christmas, having Christmas dinner with strangers. There will be service men and women overseas, away from families, sharing Christmas dinner with each other, with loved



ones present in spirit, and in their prayers. Everywhere, Christmas Dinner will be happening, joining families near and far in the spirit of giving and sharing. Sadly, many will eat and drink too much, and miss the



reason for celebration. A long time Christmas Dinner ago a hassled innkeeper found room in a stable for a refugee family. The wife was pregnant. During the night a child, a son was born. Maybe, the innkeeper did not know of the birth till the morning. But the stable inmates, God's special creatures, were there. Angels kept watch. The little family was safe. Later that day, as Sheila cooked and ate Christmas dinner with the various members of her family, she could not put out of her mind the man whose

mouth was full. "not of Christmas food, but of a foul necrotic tumour".

In the home, in spite of his disfigured face, David was accepted, loved and cherished, as he had never felt before. A little watery porridge was Christmas dinner for David, as he joined his new family, sharing Christmas in the caring atmosphere of St Luke's Hospice.

How grateful should we be, as we enjoy the smells, sight and delicious taste of Christmas dinner around the table with our families! We should be mindful of those who have, not the means, nor the ability, to appreciate the delights and treats of Christmas dinner, as we do. We should especially be thankful for God's special gift of the one born in that stable, whose life has made Christmas a joyous celebration of songs and carols, of giving and receiving, ever since. Major boost for senior students at ever-expanding Uniting Church school

VCE STUDIES at Cornish College received a significant boost recently with the announcement of funding to build a new Senior Studies Centre, set to open in 2019.

The purpose-built Centre will embrace its environment, sitting in a natural setting of 100 acres and overlooking the school's wetlands. The announcement was made by the Minister for Education. The Hon. James Merlino MP, with \$2,000,000 provided by the Victorian Government from the Capital Funding Program for Non-Government Schools. This will be matched by Cornish College to provide around \$4,000,000 funding overall.

Principal Ms Vicki Steer explained some of the benefits: "The new Centre will provide spaces for formal and small group teaching.

We recognise that learning is not confined to classrooms, though, and the large, open plan areas will support incidental learning too.



"Importantly, the space will provide opportunities for independent study, collaboration, coaching and mentoring, informal interactions and relaxation, to support students' rounded development into successful young people."The building, has been CORNISH designed by McGlashan Everist Architects,

experts in tertiary institutions and contemporary activity-based work settings. It will have the capacity to benefit around 200 senior students. College Board Chair, Reverend Dr Robert Johnson, is delighted by the announcement, adding: "Approval to build the new Senior Studies Centre is another major milestone for Cornish College and demonstrates our commitment to support teaching and learning of the established VCE program within the Senior School. The College has come

a long way in a relatively short time thanks to a vibrant and committed community of supportive parents and staff who make a difference in the lives of our students. We also thank the State Government as this funding enables construction that would not otherwise be possible."

How a focus on the future can honour the past

At the October Presbytery meeting, Rev. Chris Meneilly and three members of the Southern Mornington Peninsula Uniting Church presented a Powerpoint review of activities currently powering along at this Church in Rosebud.

SMPUC was a five church parish until 2013 when, following the voluntary closure of the Flinders and Red Hill churches during the previous few years, the remaining congregations agreed to amalgamate.

Initially, there were some angry and sad feelings of loss. Since then the combined congregation at Rosebud has flourished, with most of the "lost" members returning to join in the energetic developments being driven by the congregation's sense of mission.

Rosebud facilities are widely used by the public, such as Probus and dance groups, and we



provide a large area of space for the Adult *Hands on Health* program and rehearsal facilities for four choirs.

We also actively support a Playgroup providing funding and a paid co-ordinator. The Dromana Church and its hall have been renamed The Dromana Welcome

Centre, thus retaining this much loved facility which has been re-purposed to allow community outreach activities.

'Soup and Chatter' on Fridays welcomes everyone – congregation members, congregation 'shut-ins' and off-the-street drop-ins to enjoy fellowship over a bowl of home-made soup, slices and tea or coffee. A feature of this program, and at the Op Shop, is the involvement of volunteers from the wider community.



Dromana is also used by Narcotics Anonymous and the Family Hands on Health program. With Shire grants etc we financially support three flourishing

Play Groups where Mums and Dads can enjoy quality time with their children whilst older members of the congregation play a supportive grandparent role.

The Op Shop is now 20 years old and continues to provide a great community connection. Funds raised support local organisations such as 'Sailability' and

'Riding for the Disabled, SES Rescue boat, the C.F.A., and church missional activities.

Moving forward to the development of our most exciting mission

project – Cloverleaf. This project is the outcome of collaboration between SMPUC and Community Lifestyle

When five churches came together to breathe new life into their mission

Accommodation, an organisation initiated by older parents of intellectually disabled adults planning for the future of their children. The congregation has also agreed to support the employment of a Community Support Worker to assist families as they struggle through the bureaucratic requirements of the National Disability Insurance Scheme, NDIS, and no doubt

other issues.

After a lot of work to get funding, and battling with

planning requirements (which changed at an inopportune moment requiring new designs) the first sods will be turned in December and completion of

the 12 bed facility is anticipated in December 2018. In summation, the uniting of the members of five congregations has resulted in renewed energy for mission. In spite of the aging demographic, the congregation has increased by 15% over the past three years and we now have a vibrant fellowship who not only provide a powerful support network for its aging and frail members but actively and enthusiastically support significant missional projects.

lunch in the hall and watched video footage of the opening and other memorabilia. There was a birthday cake; cut by Barbara Bruce who has been a member


