Flash mob needed for urgent packing job

TONGA recently suffered devastating cyclonic damage.

On TV you may have seen footage of the destruction of the 100+ year-old Parliament Building, below left, or scenes of devastation alongside a double-story school block - without realizing that that was Queen Salote College, the premier girls' school of our [Methodist] partner Church in Tonga.

More than 1,600 homes and 126 classrooms were destroyed or devastated. Salt-spray borne on the winds poisoned ground-crops; bananas and other fruits were stripped from trees - food will be short for six months. Many lost household effects. Mission Liaison Group, having consulted the

General Secretary of the Methodist Church in Tonga, is asking for second-hand or new tools, building materials, household effects and non-perishable food to send by shipping container as soon as possible. If you can't take the goods to 176 Chapel Road, Keysborough, Tues/Thurs, 8-10.30 am, ring John Connan on 0419 572 936.

The cost of shipping will be about \$5,500. If you can spare a donation in support of the funds for shipping MLG would be grateful. Cheques to the Treasurer, John Stollery, #24, 360

Based on the book by Diarmaid MacCulloch and led by Malcolm Adams


Christianity has a deeply ambivalent relationship with silence.

Op Shop a triumph of ecumenism

The Toorak Ecumenical Opportunity Shop has operated for more than 35 years as an outreach initiative from three Toorak Churches – St. John's Anglican Church, St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church and Toorak Uniting Church.

Staffed by many volunteers six days a week, most of the volunteers are drawn from membership of the three churches. The Op Shop receives second-hand goods, mostly clothing, sorts and resells a proportion of the stock. Each year the Op Shop gives the proceeds of its sales to numerous charities; last year the generous financial support from the Op Shop to those in need amounted to

\$252,000, given directly through around 35 grass-roots charities.

The Op Shop accepts donations of clothing and brica-brac, books and glass-ware. Items are sorted for most readily saleable, priced and displayed, or stored for seasonal sale. The remainder of incoming stock is distributed to other charitable organisations to sell; recipients including Broadmeadows Op Shop.

The Op Shop, at 1a Caters Ave, Toorak, with a public car park opposite was joint winner in 2010 of the Stonnington Community Award. The operation of the Toorak Op Shop has given more than \$1.5 million to charities in the past 30 years. Moreover, the Op Shop is a celebration of volunteerism, ecumenism, generosity, and a place of friendship.
