Hon, Christina Rowntree (Andrew's wife) enjoyed a photo with Rev Eseta Meneilly and Hannah at the end of the evening.


Fete continues to bring folk together

New booklet sheds light

and insight on Safe Church policies

FROM the two hats of Christian faith and psychological understanding this handbook, by Vivienne Mountain, joins with other voices seeking to clarify, highlight and practise Safe Church policy. Small and easy-to-read, it is a clear and useful resource for those in many forms of ministry: the pastor, minister, child and family

worker, Sunday School teacher, pastoral care worker, counselor or chaplain. It synthesizes two frameworks, combining two sets of language, from the insights of both theology and psychology, thus uniting Christian tradition with contemporary understanding.

5000 copies of this booklet are now being distributed through various churches and para-church organizations. This first print run has been funded through donations and is being distributed free of charge. A second printing is anticipated when funding becomes available. Distribution is taking place through the office of Chris Barnett of the Centre for Theology and Mission, Parkville (chris.barnett@ctm.uca.edu.au). with the University of Melbourne.



Dementia Workshop Remini-Sing St John's Uniting Church 37 Virginia St Mt Waverley 1.30pm to 3.00pm on Friday April 27th

Remini-Sing is a large Randomised Control Trial (RCT) exploring the effects of therapeutic group singing for community dwelling people with dementia and their caregivers across Victoria and Tasmania.

Kate Teggelove (RMT) is a Registered Music Therapist and Research Fellow with the University of Melbourne, currently responsible for management of the Study. She will share outcomes of research to date and share ideas for using music to support the wellbeing of people living with dementia, with particular reference to its use for connection and memory. Following Kate's presentation and discussion, we will continue a discussion on how our church congregations can provide pastoral care for people with dementia and their carers.



FOR many years the Friendship group at Wheelers Hill Uniting Church has been putting together backpacks with school supplies that are sent to the Pacific Islands by the Mission Liaison Group.

The group initially began doing two backpacks – one for a girl, one for a boy.

Four years ago we invited the congregation to participate in this project, and the involvement and was overwhelming. The first year we did 16 backpacks, the next year 20 backpacks and the last two years it has been 28! The support for the backpack program from our small congregation is a great outreach to others less fortunate than ourselves and helps us to look outside our own "back yard."
