I5th Assembly meeting held in our home town

THE Assembly is coming to Melbourne in just over a week, and it should prove to be stimulating and spiritually nourishing for the life of the Uniting Church in a rapidly changing environment.

Assembly representatives - many from Port
Phillip East Presbytery - will be gathering
at Box Hill Town Hall for the 15th triennial
Assembly meeting to prayerfully discern the
Holy Spirit and make decisions together.
Among the Assembly's hot topics this year are
discussions on same gender marriage in Uniting
Churches, an important statement on climate change



and a proposal on Aboriginal Sovereignty.

The Triennial Assembly is a meeting of approximately 265 members of the Uniting Church in Australia, held in

a different state every three years. Discussions and deliberations centre on the direction and priorities of the Uniting Church in Australia for the next triennium. These will affect us all, so it is important to follow the proceedings.

On Sunday, July 8 the opening evening service at St Michael's Uniting Church will install Dr

Deidre Palmer as the new National President.

When announcing her theme of Abundant Grace, Liberating Hope, Dr Deidre Palmer stated: "In a time where we could focus on scarcity – fewer people and less financial resources – God's gift of abundant grace calls us to be a people who share our gifts, resources, time and energy generously.

"In a time where our world is overshadowed by violence, hatred and suspicion of the other, the Dr. Deidre Palmer Christian Educator, Social Worker, Moderator Synod of SA

Church is called to live an alternative narrative of hope, reconciliation and love.

"Liberating Hope is an action of God in us, and it is a call for us to participate in God's mission in the world. Liberation movements around the world have been inspired by the Gospel of Christ, to be communities of resistance and protest in the face of injustice and inequality."

For six days Assembly members will meet at the Box Hill Town Hall to receive reports, consider proposals, and build a Christian community of discernment and discipleship.

As host, the Synod of Victoria and Tasmania is



Heartwarming results at this annual sleepout

Compassion is one of the four values at Cornish College, and compassion is what warmed hearts recently





All funds are donated to the charity Backpack Bed for Homeless who have an award-winning backpack/swag design (known as a Backpack Bed) that charities can distribute to those awaiting accommodation.

Mr Jarrod Davies, Chaplain at Cornish College and organiser of the Winter Sleepout, says: "We are very grateful for the opportunity to make a small difference through this community event.

Cornish people are generous, and we are ecstatic that this record amount of funds will help 240+ people sleep safer and with more dignity".

On the night, 51 students from Years 6-12, two former students and 10 staff slept outside in cardboard boxes plus a program aimed to encourage conversation and action: from a campfire on the College island, to nightgolf, to discussions about homelessness.

The team also reached another record of preparing 850 sandwiches from food donations, distributed to schoolchildren without lunches and others in need by charity Eat Up Australia founded by Lyndon Galea, pictured above left with students.

Year 7 student Patrick became involved saying: "It's really important to appreciate what we have in our life and help other people that aren't as lucky. To spend one night sleeping in the cold, really makes me understand what it would be like to be homeless and cold. It makes me want to raise as much money as I can". Principal Vicki Steer adds: "Our school motto is



'Make A Difference'. The fact that this event reaches capacity within just a number of days proves how empathetic our students are. This is very much in line with the Cornish vision, providing an education to develop citizens who make a positive difference and contribute to a sustainable future."

Stuart salutes bravery of sexual abuse survivors

The current President of the Uniting Church in Australia Stuart McMillan - until July 8, 2018 recently announced that the Uniting Church will opt in to the Federal **Government's National**

Redress Scheme for people who have experienced institutional child sexual abuse.

"We acknowledge the impact of child sexual abuse in the lives of those who have been abused in our institutions or those of our predecessor Churches. To each survivor and all of their families, I am truly sorry," said Mr McMillan. "It is our sincere hope that this National Redress Scheme will allow survivors of institutional child sexual abuse to access support to help them in their lives," said Mr McMillan.

All seven Uniting Church Standing Committees have resolved to opt in to the National Scheme. The WA Synod's entry is conditional on the WA Government also opting in, something which is expected to occur within weeks.

"I want to specifically acknowledge the pain and the courage of survivors who retell and relive their experience whenever there are changes to redress schemes or public discussion on child sexual abuse." Discussing these issues can raise difficult emotions and past memories for some people. 

Widows connect across the Pacific through shared craft

SEWING, patchwork, embroidery, and knitting... in Fiii! We were asked who wants to knit wool in Fiji; but far be it from us to question why this was the request from a Methodist Church Women's group in Suva. A group of six ladies from Southern Mornington Peninsula, spent three weeks in Suva working with a

group called 'Marama ni Sarifaci', meaning the 'widows of Zarephath'.

Six women from the Rosebud, Red Hill, Hastings area, had a very productive experience in Suva working with a group of

18 Fijian women and building ongoing contact which

the Southern Mornington Peninsula congregation is willing to encourage. Members of the Suva based group are mainly the widows of Methodist clergy. When the Minister (husband) passes away, the remaining family suddenly are faced with a serious drop in income. The Women's ministry arm of the Fiji Methodist Church is responding to this need through the above named

group. The Rev's Eseta and Chris Meneilly of SMP,

facilitated a large project group three vears ago of 30 people and again this current smaller project. The SMP group took extra cases of clothing. shoes, haberdashery items, fabric, knitting needles and yarns etc. and donated two new sewing machines to the Fiji group. The time we spent together was full of excitement, learning

and sharing a variety of skills. Designs and ideas for various garments and

practical items were taught;

to all be dressed in the same material. In this photo the group were speaking of their experience to the SMPUC congregation.

and of course basic knitting.

Using different types of patchwork and sewing methods,

the women made cushions, guilts, vests, pot-holders, scarves and bags. We were overwhelmed by the enthusiasm of the Fijian group not only to learn knitting but their vision for developing the project to reach more women

across their wider multicultural community and needs.

There was much talking. singing, eating a wide variety of nutritious Fijian foods and above all the building of friendships. As four of our own group also are widows, there was a deeper sense of walking and sharing a journey of life and faith together.

Rev Chris' knowledge of Fiji enabled our group to visit people in their own urban village, to participate in worship with them, attend family

gathering, experience the busy urban life of Suva, all

adding to our knowledge during this wonderful cultural experience. As a result of the workshops, the Fijian group are already producing items for their stalls at the annual Methodist Church Choir event in August. They are also planning toward sending four members to SMP in March 2019, toward which SMP is raising funds to help our new

friends visit and experience relevant craft programs in and around our region.

Reflections on Faith

IN the Church I attended every Sunday a long time ago the seats were numbered.

Grandfather made sure we all sat there as a family. He guarded the entrance. Did he pay for it? I wondered if the seats in heaven were numbered. The other thing I remember was the large choir. Every Sunday, leading the singing and rendering an anthem. The choir sang Amen at the end of prayers, and led

the threefold Amen after the Benediction. Sometimes there was a sevenfold Amen. I reckoned this must have been for special occasions.

The Bible mentions Amen at very important times. After worship and dedications. It is the people's Amen. A reverent response to the truth of the word.

So be it, we agree, that is true is its meaning. Sometimes the word is Verily, which means 'in truth.'

In the New Testament Jesus is called the AMEN. The true, faithful and trusty one. We can trust his every word. VERILY I SAY UNTO YOU signals his every word is God's Word which can be trusted. He is the true and faithful messenger.

In his Second Letter to Corinth, Paul says to Timothy and Silvanus: "For the Son of God, Jesus Christ, whom we proclaimed among you was not YES and NO: but in him it is always YES. For in him everyone of God's promises is a YES. For this reason it is through him that we say the AMEN to the glory of God." (2nd Corinthians:19-20)

Reflection:

Amen is a special word, a sacred response in worship to the Word.Not to be spoken lightly. And in these troubled times for the world John's word in the Book of Revelation is a resounding prayer:
