
#### In transition...

THREE months into my role as Presbytery

Minister, I'm very much aware that moving roles, moving cities, and moving house,

involves a lot of internal adjustment. writes Rev Duncan Macleod.

Presbytery Minister Team Leader. It's not a simple matter of learning



William Bridges writes: "It isn't the changes that do you in; it's the transitions. Change is not the same as transition. Change is situational: the new site, the new boss, the new team roles, the new policy. Transition is the psychological process people go through to come to terms with the new situation. Change is external; transition is internal".

Transition has been a significant part of my previous roles with the Uniting Church in Australia and the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. Most of that has been with congregations, presbyteries and staff as they work through endings, living in the 'in-between' or neutral zone, and launching new beginnings.

As at the beginning of June, Port Phillip East Presbytery has a full ministry team, with Anneke Oppewal, Craig Mitchell and myself as Presbytery ministers, alongside the office bearers and people serving on committees and task groups. We'll be celebrating that new start at a special Induction and Presbytery meeting on Wednesday, June 19, 7.30pm at Noble Park UCA. There are plans for various congregations, agencies and groups from across the presbytery to

participate in the celebrations. So, we'd love to see as many as possible there to share in this new direction! Cont. on page 2

activity on camp has a risk assessment submitted to our core team? We love how hard our leaders work to keep our campers safe.



#### Religion and politics can mix



THE Village Uniting Church in Mt Eliza held an election forum for the candidates in the Dunkley electorate in the lead up to the recent federal election.

Liberal MP Chris Crewther, Labor candidate
Peta Murphy and Greens candidate Emily
Green were all present to respond to questions.
The forum followed the key areas covered
in the Assembly election resource, asking
candidates questions on climate change,
Australian aid, First Peoples, amongst others
on regular issues like health, education and the
economy. Opportunity for audience questions
was also provided.

The church set clear boundaries at the beginning, reminding everyone present that this was a place of peace and prayer and to treat everyone with respect. Given there is a political process, and party policy, the questions and the forum were designed to hear what is behind the candidates, what are their values and vision for our country.

REv Cameron McAdam says: "A number of people in the audience spoke with me after and told me how helpful it had been, and certainly the atmosphere is one of respect. It makes people realise that we can do politics well if we trv."

Chris Crewther, who subsequently lost his seat, wrote after the forum: "Fantastic to take part in the Dunkley community candidate's forum tonight! Thank you to Village Uniting Church in Mount Eliza and Rev Cameron McAdam for hosting, Cr Sam Hearn for MC-ing, fellow candidates for participating and every local community member who took time out of their schedule to take part and ask questions."

'It's also the vigorous old-style assembly where people can vote for West Papua. This next General Assembly in New York is the Papuans best shot at freedom in decades, and I want my church in the gallery alongside all the African, Caribbean and Pacific member-states".



We, the undersigned, are members of a group of mostly clergy, both women and men, still actively involved in the life of the Church. We meet on a regular basis to explore and discuss issues of faith, church and society from a contemporary perspective. We express our profound



concern at the horrific events in Christchurch, New Zealand in March 2019, and believe that our church should respond strongly, and with conviction.

While we understand the complexity of the situation, which makes the sheeting home of blame problematic, we accept responsibility to examine our own thought and practices and those of our various churches. We do this in the hope that we can identify our contribution, intentional or otherwise, to the construction of a social, religious and political environment conducive to race-based hate speech. We, as followers of Jesus, acknowledge that our churches have in times past promoted notions that racial and cultural superiority are justified. We acknowledge that such notions have contributed to the worst behaviour imaginable. The fifty deaths in Christchurch are but the most recent symptoms of faulty theology,

imaginable. The fifty deaths in Christchurch are but the most recent symptoms of faulty theology, poor education, careless talk and the mistaken identification of faith as a marker of superiority. Often when our society, or individuals within it, behave in a violent and offensive manner we have said little or have maintained our silence.

In recognition of our churches' complicity we, the undersigned, ask of the churches that, in word and deed, we together: embrace inclusiveness, and publicly denounce division; engage in open-minded study of other faiths actively build bridges between faiths and cultures, and decry the forces that keep them apart; resist the urge to convert or demean people of other faiths; proclaim love and peace as the very essence of God's will; stand up in our communities for justice; speak out against hate speech; call out racism.

us with its gentleness; carrying us away on the invisible wings of prayerfulness. Taking us to a place where neither language nor culture was a barrier. The song becoming an expression of faith flowing from the hearts and voices of a community for whom God is neither abstract nor absent, but real and present.

Such a moment cannot be engineered, and probably not produced again.

But that's ok. It was a moment of transfiguration and we were able to share in it. The ordinary was transformed into the sublime
