Mercy mission saves thousands

AS many congregations offered prayers for those impacted by the fires all across Australia, a daring and valiant emergency evacuation was taking

place by our own Presbytery folk, writes Pastor Hannah Dungan.

As the New Year revelry was only just subsiding, about 1,000 people were evacuated from Mallacoota via navy vessels, and were processed and reunited with family at the reception centre set up in Somerville. This had led to the scrambling of support ministry in our region by chaplains and personal support workers activated through the Victorian Council of Churches



Emergencies Ministry. The VCCEM volunteers, all pictured above, many of whom were from local Uniting Churches, lovingly listened and patiently waited with anxious families for the navy vessels to bring their loved ones

home to safety.

Deep gratitude was expressed for the wonderful care they

Highly respected Elders and Members of the Bunurong Land Council offered a traditional welcome to country, which is so moving when received in the context of the treatment they have received. The "Truth will Set us Free" was the foundation of this prayerful, respectful service, one of 26 across Australia, and is hoped to inspire positive actions alongside our first people, to "Change the Heart". Before European settlement 232 years ago, an estimated 750,000 - 1 million people inhabited this continent in around 250


language groups, living in relative harmony and sustainably for

60,000+ years. They saw themselves as custodians of country and respected "Mother Earth". As one Radio National report outlined, they did not have kings and queens, did not steal land,

paid respect to neighbouring clans and only used what they needed from the land. Bruce

Pascoe's book "Dark Emu" demonstrates very clearly that the first peoples had sophisticated agriculture, land and water practices, food processing and even urban living in some areas, long before middle-eastern civilizations.




Reese Mestdagh

clear on outcomes. One of the most telling examples of this was during the *Uniting our Future* process when church buildings and assets (many from Port Phillip East, including Leighmoor UC) were being sold, amid much anguish by UCA churchgoers. This was his response in Newsbeat, November 2013: "It is easy and justifiable to critique the process that has brought the Synod to this point, but ultimately we must look to the future. The future for Leighmoor UC, a small growing congregation, stands on the cusp of growth or stagnation. This will depend largely on a proper and relatively expensive re-location of a discrete programme run for young mum's and the inclusion of members and groups joining us from churches in our neighbourhood that are being closed. Handled well, and with generous support from Presbytery and Synod, Leighmoor stands to be a stronger church in the future."

The 2020 World Day of Prayer worship service prepared by the World Day of Prayer Committee of Zimbabwe will be held on Friday, 6th March at a church in your area.

Zimbabwe means 'House of Stones' and is located in Southern Africa. It is a landlocked country that lies between the Limpopo River in the south and the mighty Zambezi in the north. Harare is the capital city and also the seat of government while Bulawayo is the second largest city. The country

has an estimated population of about 16 million people and 16 official languages. English, Shona and Ndebele are the most widely used. The Victoria Falls are a major tourist attraction and considered

one of the Seven Wonders of the World. The World Day of Prayer programme is based on Jesus' encounter with a person who although positioned for healing, had not acted. Jesus asked: "Do you want to be made well?" You are faced with this life-changing question. What are you going to do? "Rise! Take your Mat and Walk," said Jesus. Our sisters from Zimbabwe are taking Jesus' encounter as a call to act in love for peace and reconciliation. "The

be afraid to act on the word of God. God is offering us the steps for personal and social transformation."


them to explain themselves. Faith is not the passport to a secret society, but a way of coping with life over the fence, empowering ordinary people to walk each day.
