## Searching for the soul in our city streets

IF there's one reason, and one reason only, that you and your community come to the Mission Expo in May then it's this lady... Karina Kreminsky.

In an in-depth interview with *Newsbeat*, our keynote speaker on May 23rd, shared her chequered journey to re-discovering her connection with God, exploring the avenues of the traditional church until finally walking a spiritual path with local residents to form the extraordinary urban organism *Neighbourhood Matters*.

Karina explains: "I grew up in a Christian household with a typical legalistic framework. Something like 'you'll be happy if you just do the right thing.' It wasn't until my mid-20s, when I was in Argentina, that I had an experience with God that was about me reaching up to Him and Him reaching down to me. It was only then that I got the true and full idea of grace."

This experience led to an explosion of passion to tell people about Jesus. She then headed off to bible college but still says: "I never felt I wanted to be a pastor, because at that point I still thought the church was irrelevant."

What she didn't anticipate was that she would "fall in love with the church and the people of God that he works through."

Yet, there was still this niggling feeling that she wanted to participate more with God in the world.

"In church, we tended to focus on ourselves and the work became about the church more than the world," she adds.

This collided with Karina's sense of her 'original call' and so she took the bold step of leaving her job as a minister and moved to the inner-city Sydney suburb of Surry Hills.

"After moving in, I felt God spoke to me again about being a presence in the neighbourhood and where I might discover Him in the local community. So I looked for the hubs in the area. One is our Neighbourhood Centre which runs a festival every year, social services programs and regular markets." With her husband of 14 years, Dr Armen Gakavian, Karina befriended the Neighbourhood Centre Director and shared how she wanted to connect and participate in the community. Troublingly, she found that as a secular community they were 'suspicious' of her Christian roots. "So I ran a course on spirituality," she tells *Newsbeat*.

"We call it The Happiness Lab and

it looks into broad areas such as gratitude and mindfulness and exploring what it means to live a meaningful life.” This was the germination and blossoming of **Neighbourhood Matters**.

### Rev Dr Karina Kreminsky shares her thoughts with Helen Beeby

The journey has not been easy, and what could be described as a source of dismay for Karina is how and

why people are sceptical about the modern church and can be uncomfortable to learn you are Christian. “They don’t find Christianity relevant to their lives and we can all feel a bit hopeless about that. Sometimes we come across as judgemental, too. What we need is a radical shift in the church in favour of supporting people of God in our

neighbourhoods. We need to support the scattered church, not focus on preserving the institution.

“What I hope people will take away from the May Expo event is how to be Christ in our neighbourhoods. To ask how can we be representatives of Christ in our secular culture? What is it like to live where we live and be of value as faith people? How do we participate and discern with God - because it’s not about working *for* God, it’s about working *with* God.”

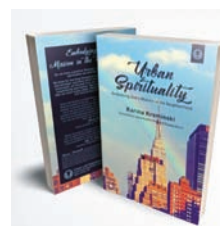


## ...and there’s so much more at the Expo

# Mission Pilot takes off

Weekend Intensive for our

Mission Pilot congregations. Teams from Glen Waverley UC and Cheltenham-Mentone UC came together over two days in mid-February at Phillip Island. It was a buzz of conversation, teaching, story-telling, biblical exploration and worship.

I led the group in looking at the life of the early church and what we could learn about being missional communities today. We then used a video case study of a congregation being transformed through engaging with its local community. Phil McCredden provided input about changes in society and some of the challenges posed for the church, as well as exploring what helps communities change over time.

Steering group members Belinda Clear, Dev Anandarajan, Greg Fry and Jay Robinson were involved in getting to know the congregations' team members and their church's stories.

Duncan Macleod led a session on discernment



— how do we really

notice what is going on in our local neighbourhoods and discern where the Spirit is at work?

On Sunday morning each team made a "Mission Map" of their neighbourhood. This became part of our prayer time together, people lighting candles to pray for those in their community.

What did people appreciate about the weekend?

*"Getting to know the others involved ... Mission beginning with listening to the wider community and to God ... Being in reminded that it is OK to fail ... That we can learn from our mistakes*

*... That it's OK for some people to dislike change ... That change takes time ..."*

We finished the weekend with people

keen to get started and with excitement for where God may lead us!

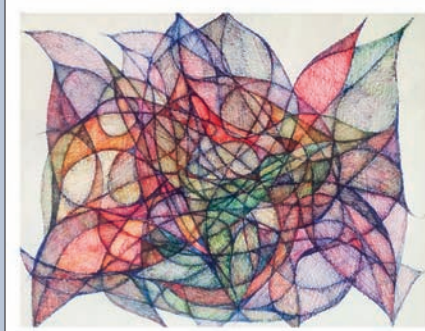

## Community and social connections are not a flash in the Sandringham pan

A PARTNERSHIP between Sandringham Uniting Church and Mercy Health that was proposed in 2012 has finally been sealed with the signing of a new contract.

This landmark moment, on January 23, comes after some visionary thinking way back in 1971, when Sandringham Methodist Church established 14 independent living units on their Bay Road land. When the Presbyterian and Methodist churches in Sandringham combined in 1977 to become the Uniting Church this community care partnership continued.

With a number of twists and turns through the decades (for the full story visit <https://www.ucappep.org/newsbeat/media-releases/>) along with detailed discussions involving representatives from Synod and Presbytery it was agreed that Mercy Health would purchase the whole site, and they now rent

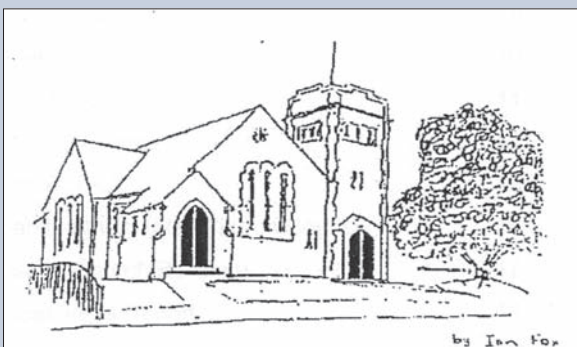
Road, to the Church Council. The agreement includes a refurbishment of the church building; the maintenance of the Memorial Garden in perpetuity; and an arrangement to cover the

protection of all the stained glass windows in the Memorial Hall.

### Keeping church history alive

The first Presbyterian church building in Trentham Street Sandringham opened in 1898 and the building as shown in the sketch by Ian



The Minister and congregation of Sandringham Uniting Church are excited by the changes and potential future mission. The window, *pictured*, was originally in the Methodist Church, shows the lantern, and speaks of this long journey and community focus: "I am the light of the world, he that follows me shall not walk in the darkness, but shall have the light of life." **John 8:12**

Fox, *opposite*, was built and dedicated on November 2nd, 1929.

The beautiful stained glass windows were in place for the opening and the magnolia tree was planted. Following union, in 1985 the Methodist Church building closed and many of the stained glass windows from the Methodist Church in Bay Road were incorporated into the buildings at the Sandringham UCA site on Trentham Road.

## Reflections on Faith

Reflections on Faith

TWO magpies have ruled our backyard for some time.

This spring they produced one child. Incessantly demanding to be fed, morsels of food are shoved down its throat. A gulp then the demand for food continues. Gradually it is learning about life. What is edible and what is not. Learning how to listen for worms underground and dig them up as its parents do. It is now slowly leaving its parents and exploring the garden itself; surprised at what it discovers. Mum or dad are not faraway to rescue it if a predator looms.

Moments of pleasure rolling with a parent on the grass and with wings outspread basking in the morning sun. But its childhood is running out. The parents want it to stand on its own two feet and leave home. Their reminding pecks are putting the young bird in place. They have had enough. It's time to fly over the fence into the wide world and make its own way.

How will it go? Many unseen challenges are over fence for the immature and unsuspecting. But its parents have prepared their offspring the best they know how, drawing on their own experience.

It is not hard to imagine human experience as similar for children growing up. Some have the example and wisdom of parents as they cross the fence into adulthood. Sadly some are without such help and have to go it alone.

Schoolies week is a kind of coming of age for some, but sometimes the challenges are so tempting that unwise choices are made, the ready availability of alcohol and illicit drugs are a problem – sometimes lethal. Where growing up has been rigid this can prove hazardous when community and parental ties are loosened.

The strength and support of good friends is important, and the influence of moral education in development brought into focus. The report of a young man who made the most of his education in school and synagogue is found in the Gospels. Jesus of Nazareth grew up in a family, respected his parents and teachers in synagogue and school but challenged the Temple teachers in Jerusalem with his questions. Luke writes that Jesus grew and increased in wisdom and stature in favour with God and man. Is this the best progress report ever written?

Jesus asked the right questions and came up with wise rules to keep his disciples, who were pupils or learners, as the Latin root indicates, on the right path. He encapsulated the secret in two commandments in his reply to a lawyer searching for wisdom. Loving God and your neighbour as yourself was the way to proceed as you crossed the fence into life.

Social responsibility and care for others is grounded in home, school and community. When we cross the fence the final responsibility for life is ours. The skills we have inherited go with us and are put to the test and increasingly challenged.

How are our young developing? Do we care? Tolerance, forgiveness and support are important attitudes. And the values we live by are the social foundations on which we build our young as they cross the fences, high and low. All have their challenges. We know because we have been there before.

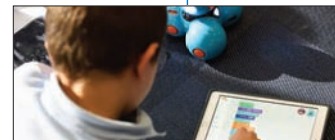
### Setting iPad restrictions - Parental controls
