An insight into what congregations, schools & members are doing

POWERFUL OUTDOOR LEARNING AT CORNISH COLLEGE

At Cornish College we are committed to caring for the land and those who come here, now and in the future.

One of the many wonderful programs that the College offers on its 100 acre classroom, is *Dhumba-dha biik* (pronounced dum-ba-dah biik). This name is Boon Wurrung language for 'Talk Country' and is a weekly outdoor learning program. The College has received special permission to use this term to describe the program, where all Early Learning Centre and primary students spend an extended period of time each week outside (all year-round and regardless of the weather) learning on and about their country.

The students form strong connections to the land. Whilst out 'on country' the students are able to develop their resilience, independence, communication, mindfulness and problem-solving skills. They bring their passions for the environment back to the classroom where they discuss and share their findings, and use them as a provocation for writing, mathematics, inquiry and scientific investigations and play.

The students explore, wonder, pose questions, offer ideas and solutions and use scientific vocabulary in an authentic context.

As they walk, there are many conversations. Mostly these conversations are about nature and there are always questions. Children have a natural affinity with their world and there is just so much that they want to know and discover. Outdoors, the environment is a powerful and engaging second teacher.

Kelly Skilton, Younger Generations - Digital & New Communities

Looking through the February Crosslight, and this issue of the Newsbeat, it may seem like everyone is dying their hair green. However, on second look you will realise it is just the same person in all the photos and one that is no stranger to PPEP. So why is it that I am being "uploaded" to the Synod? Well, in case you had not heard, last month I stepped into a new role within the VicTas Synod working on the Younger Generations team. The team, as a collective, will be looking at resourcing and equipping our younger generations across the church, and my main focus will be the New and Digital Communities.

Since the arrival of COVID-19, our communities look very different. We can see they are different, and we can feel that they are different. The truth is that a lot of people don't know what to make of it. What do discipleship, mission and leadership look like now? How do we engage our communities in person and online? These are big questions and some of us have thoughts and ideas about them, but they can be overwhelming for those of us just trying to keep caring for one another; unpacking these complex questions is just not on this week's to-do list... or even next week.

But these questions are now on my to-do list. It is important that we take the time to unpack the reality of this fast-changing in-person and online world so we are able to continue being the church with our local communities.

People have asked me, "Why you? and how did you get here?" Currently you will find me as a 32-year-old, second-generation South African Australian... with green hair. I have been employed by the church since I was 23, serving on the ministry team at Murrumbeena Uniting; the multi-faith Chaplaincy team at Monash University; doing office administration at Armadale Baptist; and supply ministry at The Korean Church of Melbourne (KCM). In addition, I started a new form of youth and young adults ministry called *The Sonder Collective* (which includes digital ministry). There are also countless organisations and communities outside the Uniting Church that I have led and volunteered with. Before all this, you would have found me serving as a barista.

I decided that instead of entering the design industry, I was going to continue studying and so I enrolled in my Bachelor of Theology at Whitley College. In hindsight, studying theology does seem like an obvious step toward working in the church, but the first time I really found myself considering it was when I got a phone call (to be honest, a number of phone calls) about whether a Youth and Young Adults position at Murrumbeena Uniting would interest me. I was in my last year of theological studies (well, so I thought), and living in Healesville, but as soon as I got off the phone I jumped into my car and drove an hour and a half to find this church. When I got there I drove to the back of the car park to pray and listen to whether or not this was the direction I should be going. Well, what started as prayer ended in tears (good ones) and so I wrote an application for this new-found church community and began the ten years of 'church' that you have read about above.

What started as a simple, "I want to learn more about who God is to me, and who I am to God" led me to study not only my Bachelor of Theology but also my Masters in Theological Studies, and now I am halfway through a Masters in Missional Leadership. Across each of these courses, my main focus has been on adolescent faith development in 21st Century Australia.

REFLECTIONS ON GROWTH

Rev Anneke Oppewal reflects on Growth and the experiences she faced in 2022. Exploring the story of Nicodemus, she asks, how do you feel you will experience growth in the coming year?



Casting my mind back over 2022 with the theme for this edition of Newsbeat in mind I wondered where, for me, growth had most clearly happened. Thinking back my heart gradually filled with gratitude for all the many instances and opportunities that helped me grow over the past year, realising that my life has been full of instances and opportunities that have changed me and helped me grow more and more into myself as well as getting closer to God. And how wonderful it is that that experience of growth never seems to have stopped.

Three things stood out in particular from the year: The first was finishing my Graduate Diploma in Supervision with relational changes that brought a wealth of new insights and opportunities to share and practise with fellow supervisors as well as receiving feedback on supervision I provided to others outside the course.

In addition, there was the five day course on indigenous ways of mediation and conflict management with We-Ali. We were invited to set aside some of our cultural biases and submit ourselves, while we were learning, to a way of looking and dealing with conflict that goes back to practices that have proven to be effective and helpful going back thousands of years before European settlement.

Alongside these two, there was the once a month conversations in the cafe at Robinsons Bookshop in Glen Waverley where we talked in a small group about post colonial theology, racism, activism and church in an intercultural setting that was at times awkward and challenging but always richly rewarding. And then there was more.... conversations with colleagues, challenging meetings with Church Councils reflecting on their future, pastoral conversations around ill health and bereavement, books that offered insights and inspiration where I hadn't expected it.

What all of these things have in common is relationality, connecting with others and being open to being transformed in the process. It reminded me of the story of Nicodemus (John 3). Here someone who presumably knew it all, who was steeped in tradition and learning, and an experienced leader of the community that he was, was prepared to seek out an opportunity to speak to Jesus. He opened himself to another perspective and way of doing religion, changing his existing convictions and allowing something new to be born into his life as it was.

I wonder what experiences of change and transformation have opened new horizons for you in the past year and what they will be in the coming year? What will bring you the excitement and energy of renewal and a change of perspective or intensifying of experience that will help you grow? What will you share of that experience to others around you too?

There are many stories in the gospel about growth. About seeds that grow into plants and even trees. About kernels of hope and faith changing the world around them for the better. About people opening their hearts and minds to following Jesus and finding themselves walking a different path than they perhaps had been on before - finding abundance and blessing in places that they may not have discovered had they stayed where they were. I wonder where you might find those seeds of faith and hope growing on your journey, leading you deeper into the journey that we've all been invited to through Christ; to make a difference in this world and be people of healing, justice grace and peace in a myriad of ways.

JUST DO IT! PUTTING FAITH INTO PRACTICE



Dr Craig Mitchell, Presbytery Minister: Church Development, writes about how faith is a verb. Let's put our faith into practice and get ourselves and our congregations to Just Do It!

Discipleship is Being and Doing

Watching the Australian Open Tennis, I am bombarded with images of the Nike "tick" logo on players' clothing, and reminded of the company's slogan "Just do it!"

Get up.

Get out.

Get going.

And I'm also reminded that faith is a verb. Christian discipleship is about being and doing. Belief in action.

Andrew Roberts speaks of *Holy Habits*. Richard Foster writes about *Spiritual Disciplines*. Dorothy Bass and others describe *Christian Practices*. These refer to the faith-filled actions of followers of Jesus Christ that embody the Way of the people of God in the world.

If the being of discipleship is about abiding with God in Christ and being transformed by the Spirit's presence, the doing is about acting in ways that welcome and help to bring about the purposes of God for our world; doing or imitating the habits that we see in Jesus and his disciples, doing or participating in the ongoing ministry and mission of Christ.

Habits of Faithful Living

A common reference for exploring Christian practices is the description in Acts 2:42-47 of the life of the early church. How did the early Christians live as a community? What marked them as distinctive? Christian writers list a range of inward and outward Christian practices or disciplines. Here are some examples:

Dorothy Bass – keeping Sabbath, singing our lives, hospitality, discernment, household economics, forgiveness, and honouring the body (and more!)

Craig Dykstra – interpreting the Scriptures together, worshipping God together, giving generously and receiving gratefully, tolerating failures and encouraging one another's vocations, working together to maintain and create life-sustaining social structures that accord with God's will, and praying, both together and by ourselves (and more!)

Diana Butler Bass – justice, healing, beauty, testimony, contemplation, worship, discernment, diversity, reflection, hospitality

Practices are disciplined in that they are patterned on following Christ. They constitute personal and communal rhythms of life, and they form, inform and transform our lives and our world. Practices are not simply *imitation* of Christ, rather they are a *participation* in the life of God and the Way of Christ.

Growing in Christian Practices

From May 2023 Port Phillip East Presbytery will be offering resources for exploring and deepening our Christian practices as a way for congregations to be intentional about growing disciples.

The Mission & Leadership Development Committee (MLDC) has a team working on resources on these practices.

- Resources for three Christian practices will be produced each year from 2023-2025 (a total of nine)
- Each practice comes with two months of resources for use in worship, small groups, and personal or household settings
- The resources are recommended for use by congregations between Easter and Advent – you decided when to use them
- You choose how many of the three practices you wish to focus on. Each year we will add three additional practices to choose from.

Resources will be free to download, and will include some recommended, optional resources for purchase from Christian publishers.

This is designed as an optional, whole of congregation idscipleship formation focus for a particular period of time. The approach includes exploring the biblical and theological bases for Christian practices as well as learning through experience and from experience. Christian faith and living are formed in community.

We're excited to be providing this approach towards broadening and deepening our intentional faith development in congregations.

DUNCAN'S MINISTRY FORMATION JOURNEY

In 2022, Duncan Turuva tells us about 2022, a remarkable year of learnings in his formation and academic journey towards ministry in the Uniting Church.



Firstly, it was good to immerse myself fully into my practical placement after the continued lock downs and restrictions, and secondly, it was benefical for me to take on subjects that I felt were needed for me to gain a better understanding of issues within our Australian context.

My practical placement was at St. Leonards Uniting Church, Brighton Beach under the leadership of the Rev. Kim Cain. Over the year, I have learnt many aspects of how important it is to ensure that the church's liturgy, reflection, and focus is relevant in our context. I have produced an acrostic to describe my observations and learning in my time there. For me St. Leonards is a **H-O-M-E**:

Hospitable. **O**rganised. **M**inistry to its congregants and community. **E**quipping its members to be relevant in their community.

Secondly, in my academic journey the subject Christian Assembly: Orders of Ministry with Associate Professors Stephen Burns and Geoff Thompson took me to a greater understanding of ordained ministry.

I also was fortunate to sit in on a Queer Theology intensive led by the Reverends Joe Inkpin and Penny Jones. What an eye opener it was to understand our Queer community within and outside of the church, how they read the biblical texts, and even more importantly in my own opinion, how they can enrich the church with their grace and giftings. In the previous semesters, I took more classes on the Old Testament and Womanist studies with Associate Professor Monica Melanchthon whose lectures and material I continue to recommend.

Finally, as I come closer to the conclusion of this phase the formation, I cannot be more grateful for the faculty of Pilgrim Theological College, hands down, one of the best bunch of teachers in the field of theology. They have not only educated me in their relevant areas of teaching but have taken me under their wings, given me the grace to deconstruct and reconstruct my theology, and have given me the space to speak and lead the candidate community.

To me the faculty at Pilgrim is what Jewish philosopher Abraham Joshua Heschel described when he said, 'What we need more than anything else is not textbooks but text people. It is the personality of the teacher which is the text that the pupils read; the text they will never forget". The faculty of Pilgrim are certainly ones that will be hard for me to forget.

Finally, I am looking forward to the journey ahead and where the Spirit will lead my spouse and myself.

DANIEL'S MINISTRY FORMATION JOURNEY

Following ministry overseas, Daniel Sihombing tells his story of searving and learning.



Hi, I am Daniel Sihombing, a candidate for the Ministry of the Word in the UCA and a supply minister at the Korean Church of Melbourne. I went through the Selection process last October and am just about to start the formation program.

Born in Indonesia, I moved to Australia in 2019. I had been in ministry for some time, although I'd never been ordained. I started my theological training in 2005, and carried out various ministry roles since then. I finished my Masters and just recently completed my PhD dissertation.

When I moved to Melbourne four years ago, I realized I had to learn and adjust to many new things. I was excited for the opportunities and the new experiences approaching. One experience that stood out to me was serving in a Korean church this has been a great learning experience thus far in my ministry. The worship was wonderful and I even now love to sing some Korean hymns. Doing ministry in a different setting has also had its challenges.

During my time at KCM I managed to organize a futsal game between Korean Church of Melbourne and Caulfield Indonesian Uniting Church. What a lot fun!

Nevertheless, doing ministry in a different setting also has its challenges. Being able to preach in my native language is something I miss, but thankfully I occasionally get an opportunity to do so at Caulfield.

Within church ministry I have found that there are many experiences and challenges, but as the old saying goes, I'll try to do my best and let God do the rest.

This is part of my story.



NEW TO OUR TEAM



At the November meeting of Presbytery David Higham was elected as the new Deputy Chair, taking up his role in March 2023.

Prior to joining the UCA, David Higham was a member of the Methodist Church in the UK, where he became a confirmed member on 4th April 1965. He has been attending worship in the Uniting Church since 2008 when he first visited Melbourne.

David worked for the Royal Mail in the UK. His last appointment was that of Area Manager. He managed a workforce of around a 1000, including 50 managers and support staff. This experience of leading a team of highly skilled and knowledgeable people enables him to understand, gain and develop the kinds of behaviour and skills necessary to contribute to the work of the Presbytery Standing Committee and assist the Chair in leading the Presbytery.

David and his wife Val migrated to Australia in December 2012 and joined the UCA, first as members of Croydon UCA. Moving in 2015, they moved to Narre Warren and then transferred their membership to St Andrew's Berwick where they are still members.

In January 2020 David was invited to provide Long Term Supply ministry for Seaford Uniting Church. This supply is continuing and David has been commissioned in the ministry of Pastor in this role. He has been a member of Presbytery since 2016, firstly as a representative for St Andrew's Berwick and since 2020 in his role at Seaford. He was a member of the PPEP Standing Committee in 2019 and 2020 and is currently a member of the Mission Leadership Development Committee and the Synod/Presbytery Money for Mission Steering Committee.




