Reflecting Theologically

The Lectionary readings for this Sunday are: Genesis 29:15-28, Psalm 105:1-11 or Psalm 128, Romans 8:26-39, Matthew 13:31-33, 44-52.

Matthew 13:31-33, 45-52, the parable of the mustard seed, with a small seed growing into a large tree that shelters the birds of the air fits into the theme of National Tree Day. The way God grows big things from small things can talk to the life of faith and the church and the everyday actions that we do. The three parables about the kingdom

of heaven remind us of the preciousness of the kingdom, which we contribute to with our actions here and now.

Romans 8 – This chapter contains the passage where creation is groaning and longing to be set free bondage to decay along with the children of God (Romans 8:12-23 covered on Sunday 23 July). This Sunday's reading starts with how the Spirit helps us in our weakness and helps us to pray. There are many things that we need to pray for in relation to caring for our environment.

An alternative theological approach could be to look at some biblical texts with trees in them – for example: Genesis 2:9, 16-17 and 3:1-7; Psalm 1; Matthew 12:33-37; and Revelation 21:1-6 and 22:1-2.

Early Word/Intergenerational

Tree of Life biblical theme video from The Bible Project can be found at https://bibleproject.com/explore/video/tree-of-life/ and downloaded for free. All trees can remind us of the stories of the tree of life at the beginning and end of the bible and the invitation to be joined through Jesus into God's life.

There are many interactive ways of telling the parable of the mustard seed. You could also decorate the front of your church with trees or plants or greenery.

Take Action

- 1. **Plant a Tree** We encourage you to consider planting a native tree or shrub on your church grounds. You can find advice on suitable local native trees at your local nursery or Council. You may want to encourage your congregation to invite friends or family for your special service to plant a tree. You could also organise a small plaque for the tree to highlight your concern for trees and the whole environment.
- Raise funds to help others plant trees There are many organisations that plant trees in Australia, including the Tree Project https://treeproject.org.au/, Greening Australia https://www.greeningaustralia.org.au/events/, Landcare https://landcareaustralia.org.au/, and organisations that plant trees overseas, such as One Tree Planted https://onetreeplanted.org/ and Ecologi https://ecologi.com/business/impact-shop.
- 3. Work towards a Five Leaf Eco-Award Holding a worship service based around the environment would count for the eco-worship part of the basic Five Leaf Eco-Award. If you turn National Tree Day into a community outreach event where you invite people from the community, family and friends to join in planting trees, then that would count for the eco-outreach part of the Award.
