REGENERATIONAL RESOURCE

For many years, Cornish College chaplain, Rev Claire Dawe, has dreamed of writing a book on intergenerational ministry. That dream has now come true!

Dennis Freeman, Cornish College's Community Relations Director, reports on the new resource "Regenerational: Introducing Churches to Intergenerational Ministry."

For the last two years, the Cornish College Chaplain, Rev Claire Dawe, has been working with a small team from Australia and the United Kingdom on a passion project to write a new book for churches and faith communities to encourage intergenerational ministry.

This is a passion of Claire's as she, along with the other team members and many people of faith around the world, believe that the strength of communities is when all gather regardless of age or any other artificial divider.

All ages can offer insights and can mentor and support others. As communities, we need to relearn the benefits of intergenerational connections, and this includes faith communities.

Called **Regenerational**, the book is a free, practical, downloadable resource which is also available in print through Mediacom, for a small fee.

It includes four complete services anyone can run, full details to prepare a team and the services, a review framework, and coaching tips with further information.

Each service has a summary order of service, and details of preparation required for the full service.

In addition, choices of activities are provided to enable local contextualisation. Whilst the services are structured with a particular liturgical format in mind, they can be readily adapted for a specific context, as required.

St David's Parkdale UC celebrated its 100th Anniversary on Sunday 29 Oct, which was a great day filled with fun, laughter and joy.

It was a fabulous celebration with 220 people in attendance. The day commenced with worship based around our chosen theme of 'Let Your Light Shine'.

Voices were raised in praise as they accompanied our worship band with a mix of contemporary songs and traditional hymns. It was a rousing service of intergenerational worship and the moderator Rev David Fotheringham embraced our theme in his message.

Following the service, lunch and fellowship were the order of the day. As well as our regular attendees, we were joined by local dignitaries, Presbytery representatives, former ministers, neighbours and many members from years gone by. The constant hum of people catching up with one another filled the hall and it was a delight to see so many renewing acquaintances and relishing the day.







St David's Parkdale Uniting Church began life as Parkdale Methodist Church on November 4, 1923, initially meeting in a hall on a neighbouring corner block. The existing church was completed in 1926 and has undergone a number of modifications since.

After union in 1977, its history became intertwined with the Mordialloc Methodist Church and the North Mordialloc Presbyterian Church. With the subsequent closures of these two churches, the church in Parkers Road became known as St David's Parkdale Uniting Church and continues to shine within Parkdale and the surrounding communities.

We look forward to serving our Lord God and the local community for many years to come.

PIPE ORGAN ON THE MOVE AFTER 40 YEARS

Over the years the pipe organ at Mt Waverley has been a blessing to several congregations since it was built in 1961. Cliff Harding tells the story of the organ, and how it is now time for it to be a blessing for another congregation.

In 1983 the South Essendon Uniting Church donated their pipe organ to the then High Street Road Uniting Church, Mount Waverley. The organ had been made in 1961 by English organ builders JW Walker & Sons, as one of their several "off-the-shelf" models – low cost yet versatile, with 2 full-size manuals and pedals plus a variety of stops. It was originally donated to the South Essendon Methodist Church by the Gilbertson family. In 1982 the church was sold to the Salvation Army and the congregation moved over the road to St Johns UC. The Salvation Army did not require the organ.

Geoff Willis (a former organist at St Johns and occasionally at South Essendon) learnt of its availability late in 1982 and, aware of its potential, arranged for the organ to be on permanent loan to the church for as long as it remains a place of worship.

In early 1983, with individual donations and pledges to cover the anticipated costs, work began.



The organ was transported in bits and pieces in a convoy of cars and trailers. The platform on which the three hundred pipes sit was designed by Howard Fried, and the front display ("dummy") pipes were constructed to scale by Novar Birrell, using PVC and painted with real gold-leaf donated by Balwyn UC. Indistinguishable from the real thing! The instrument was re-dedicated in August 1983, with members of the Gilbertson family present.

It has been described by organ aficionados as one of the best of its kind in Melbourne.

Our congregation recently celebrated 40 years since the arrival of the organ, and has experienced much musical and worshipful joy over the years from having such a fine organ.

The High Street Road Uniting Church congregation has recently joined with St John's Uniting Church in Mount Waverley Village, which is currently undergoing renovations. The new congregation is called Mount Waverley Uniting Church, and it is expected that the move will take place by mid next year.

Options for a future home for the organ are being considered in conjunction with St John's Essendon. The organ itself is free, but any new owner would be required to cover the transport and installation costs.

WORKING TOGETHER AT WESTERN PORT PARISH

When changes occur, some people take the challenges very hard. Let's take a look into how three congregations have made a parish work together.

The Western Port UC Parish embraces Balnarring, Crib Point and Hastings congregations, all nestled along the western side of Western Port where it is world renowned for its conservation areas.

Over the years, quiet coastal villages have flourished into vibrant and bustling communities whilst experiencing enduring tourism potential especially during the holiday periods. Follow the coastline to discover pristine beaches, Cerberus Naval Base, a marine terminal, precious wetlands, some industrial complexes, and recreational fishing. Inland, there is a range of agricultural pursuits such as farming, orchards, grazing, vineyards, and equine centres amongst the gently rolling hills of the Mornington Peninsula. This is a wonderful part of God's creation which we are fortunate to experience.

We are blessed to have a full-time ordained minister in the Rev. Nigel McBrien who conducts weekly services at Crib Point and alternates services between Balnarring and Hastings. In addition, Nigel provides resources for elder led services and sets up Zoom service broadcasts. Although retired, Rev. Wal Baker conducts two services per month, one each at Balnarring and Hastings. Their caring devotion to the Western Port Parish is greatly appreciated. Within the Parish there is a combination of inter-church missional and support activities. On the fifth Sunday of the month, when one occurs, the three churches combine to conduct a Parish service which celebrates a missional activity that the Parish supports. Our enormously successful Op Shop at Crib Point is well supported by church and community volunteers. Profits are distributed 60% for Parish funding and 40% for Uniting Church and humanitarian appeals and local community projects. The Op Shop actively supports the Mission Liaison Group at Keysborough which accepts a range of items for the Pacific Islands which would otherwise go to landfill. There is a Parish - interdenominational Easter connection with the Balnarring UC and Anglicans at the Balnarring Beach dawn service and Hastings churches Stations of the Cross. The Parish churches extensively supports the Western Port Community Centre with food and toys going to disadvantaged families.


Usually on the first Saturday in January, the Parish conducts a Sausage Sizzle at Hastings Bunnings in aid of Frontier Services' Outback Links.

The Balnarring congregation recently completed a renovation of its 1936 building and added a new hall, modern kitchen, toilets, and storeroom. accommodates community groups and annually hosts Scripture Union's Family Beach Mission when thirty to forty leaders camp on-site. Using the Balnarring Beach Robertson Reserve, they conduct a free holiday family program of bible stories, games, songs, drama, and craft activities. The team aims to share the wonderful news of Jesus Christ, what He has done for them and why the Team has welcomed Him into their lives. Balnarring has also hosted two Presbytery Retreats recently. The church is excited about the 2024 commitment of a Western Port singing group to use our facilities. Our new monthly October to April community market is making progress as it enables church and community connections.

The Crib Point congregation generously hosts the monthly Parish Op Shop Committee of Management meetings. The Thursday Maundy service commences our Parish Easter celebrations. Weekly services bring together a faithful few who look after each other in times of need. Annually, the congregation arranges a substantial food bank mid-year and a collection of toys and food, both collections given to the Western Port Community Support Centre.

The Hastings congregation actively engages in church and community events. It accommodates the Parish office and meetings, and weekly services. Notable functions include the April Western Port Craft Expo which is a wonderful celebration of the best craftwork on the Peninsula. There is a wide range of exciting and participative crafty displays and activities that occupy people all day long. Since 2017 each month, church and community ladies have been sewing simple cotton dresses for an American-based church charity called Dress-a-Girl that distributes them to young girls living in poverty in Third World countries. The group has received donations of fabric, zips, lace, trims, bias binding, threads, buttons, along with a sewing machine and an overlocker.

The Western Port Parish congregations, whilst small in numbers, seeks to know and serve God, live as Christ-like disciples in our community, share faith, love, hope and resources with people, promote respect, compassion, and justice for humanity, and secure a sustainable environment for the growth and enjoyment of all creation through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit that enables us to be creative and innovative.

In a break with recent tradition, the Moderator-elect Nominating Committee put only one name forward for the position at Synod 2023. Sue Withers reported that their nominee possessed all the necessary attributes required by a Moderator. This was confirmed when the Synod agreed by consensus that Rev Salesi Taupula would become moderator of VicTas Synod from mid-2025.

Salesi now assumes the role of Moderator-elect until he takes over from David Fotheringham as Moderator in eighteen months time..

In an article by Crosslight, Salesi talked about the sense of duty he felt to be available to serve God. . "The label of L plates we were given at the time of our ordination continues to sit well with me years later because it's a humbling reminder that as Christians we remain learners on this journey, called forth to listen to one another, act together and bear witness to Christ in the world."

Born in Tonga but raised in the Northern Territory and Sydney, Salesi said his multicultural background would inform much of what he brings to the role of Moderator from 2025-28.

"I have worked in multicultural ministry and that is a passion of mine, because of my own sense of journey," he said.


REFLECTION ON SYNOD FROM PASTOR BELINDA CLEAR
